The addition of different constants or different multiplicative factors alters the intended target score, creating either a score that does not challenge the player appropriately or is too difficult compared to the standardized expectations for qualifying.

However, for the purposes of smaller entities or clubs, three members often strike the right balance between governance and efficiency, which is why this number is frequently seen as typical.

Therefore, classifying a member as active or non-active based on the length of their membership directly influences how they engage with the club's activities.
