When considering the other options, while it is true that rubrics can take time to develop and may require training to use effectively, these factors don't detract from the core nature of what rubrics offer in terms of structured assessment. Additionally, while some students might initially find rubrics complex, many ultimately benefit from the clarity they provide regarding expected outcomes and performance criteria.
