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## **Explanations**

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**1. The Boston Tea Party led to which consequence?**

- A. Led to the Stamp Act**

The key idea here is how a protest sparks a government response that escalates tensions. After the Boston Tea Party, Parliament issued a harsh set of measures known as the Intolerable Acts (Coercive Acts) in 1774. These laws punished Massachusetts and tightened imperial control: Boston Harbor was closed to most trade until the tea was paid for, colonial self-government was restricted, royal officials could be tried in Britain, and troops could be housed in colonists' homes, among other changes. This punitive response aimed to weaken colonial resistance, but it ended up uniting the colonies and accelerating their move toward independence, with actions like the First Continental Congress forming in reaction. The Stamp Act happened earlier, and the Revolution did not occur immediately as a direct consequence of this one event; independence came years later.

The main idea is that the Seven Years' War in North America ended with a clear winner and a peace settlement that reshaped the map. The English, who would become the British, triumphed, and the Peace of Paris was negotiated in 1763. This treaty confirmed British control over Canada and most lands east of the Mississippi River, marking a major redraw of North America's territorial lines. France ceded these eastern territories, while Spain's and Britain's borders adjusted elsewhere. Native tribes did not gain independence as a direct result of the war. This victory set the stage for later colonial tensions as Britain managed its larger empire and war debts. The other options don't fit because France did not retain control east of the Mississippi, there was a clear winner, and Native tribes did not achieve national independence from the colonial powers at that time.

Lowering the voting age to 18 nationwide required a constitutional amendment that explicitly sets 18 as eligible to vote in all elections. This amendment states that citizens aged 18 and older have the right to vote and that neither the United States nor any state may deny that right based on age. It was ratified in 1971, partly in response to arguments that those old enough to serve in the military should have a say in the democratic process. This change directly establishes the minimum voting age, which is why it's the correct choice. The other amendments address different aspects of voting rights: the 19th Amendment grants women the right to vote; the 15th Amendment prohibits denying the vote based on race, color, or previous condition of servitude; and the 14th Amendment covers citizenship and equal protection under the law, without setting a voting-age requirement.

Limited Government means the government's authority is bounded by law and a constitution, so it cannot act at will. This framework lays out what each branch can do and protects fundamental rights, creating checks and balances that prevent tyranny. Because power is constrained and subject to the rule of law, government actions must follow due process and respect civil liberties, even in challenging times. That's why the best answer describes established and respected restraints on government power. The other ideas—unlimited power, ignoring the Constitution during emergencies, or suspending rights without due process—go against the idea of government being bound by law and by rights.

Overseeing what the executive branch does is oversight. This is the process by which Congress reviews and supervises the policies and programs carried out by federal agencies to ensure they follow laws, operate effectively, and use funds appropriately. It happens through hearings, investigations, audits, and required reporting. Veto power is the president's ability to reject legislation, not a method for examining executive programs. Naturalization is the process of becoming a citizen, and confirmations are about approving appointments, not ongoing policy review. So the term that fits best is oversight function.

**6. What movement did Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton help organize?**

They organized a movement to secure voting rights for women, the women's suffrage movement. This goal is distinct from the civil rights movement of the 1960s, which focused on racial equality; the labor union movement, which centers on workers' rights and collective bargaining; and the environmental movement, which concentrates on conserving natural resources.

The main idea is the push for women's rights in the mid-1800s. Elizabeth Cady Stanton helped organize the Seneca Falls Convention in 1848 to discuss and advocate for rights for women, not just in one area but across legal and social equality. The gathering produced the Declaration of Sentiments, which argued that women should have the same political and legal rights as men, including the right to vote. This event is seen as the inaugurating moment of the organized women's rights movement in the United States. So the group being discussed is women. While abolitionists and reformers of the era worked on other issues—like ending slavery for African Americans or advocating for immigrant rights—the Seneca Falls Convention was specifically focused on advancing women's rights and equality.

In a representative democracy like the United States, citizens' wishes are most directly represented through the actions of their elected officials. While citizens can influence decisions by contacting officials or supporting advocacy, those actions alone don't enact laws. The President, though important, does not alone reflect the people's will, since most laws come from Congress and must work within checks and balances. Interest groups can shape policy through lobbying, but they do not personally represent the public or make the laws. So the clear channel is the work of elected representatives acting on behalf of the people.

Private life is about the personal sphere of individuals—their right to privacy and private interests. It covers matters inside the home, family, and personal communications, areas shielded from public scrutiny and government intrusion. The other options describe public life and government functions—what happens in the public sphere, the powers of the federal government, and how laws are made—which aren't about an individual's private matters. So the best choice centers on the citizen's right to privacy and private interests.

**10. Which amendment to the U.S. Constitution is most closely associated with women's suffrage?**

The main idea is identifying the amendment that guarantees women's right to vote. The Nineteenth Amendment does exactly that by prohibiting any state or the federal government from denying the right to vote on the basis of sex, and it was ratified in 1920 to guarantee women nationwide suffrage. The other amendments address different issues: the First Amendment protects freedoms like speech, religion, and assembly rather than voting rights; the Fifteenth Amendment prohibits denying the vote based on race, color, or previous condition of servitude but does not grant women the vote; the Twenty-Sixth Amendment lowered the voting age to 18, expanding suffrage by age rather than by gender.
