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Explanations

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1. Which term refers to a risk or challenge that involves choosing between undesirable options?

- A. Persuasive
- B. Dilemma**

A dilemma is a situation where you must choose between two or more options that each have drawbacks, creating a tough, risky decision. It captures that feeling of being pulled between undesirable paths and needing to weigh consequences, often with no clearly good choice. This fits the idea of a risk or challenge tied to choosing between undesirable options, because the defining feature of a dilemma is exactly that difficult trade-off and the tension it creates. Persuasive refers to trying to convince others, not to a difficult decision. A literary journal is simply a publication for literary work. An allegory is a narrative technique where characters or events symbolize deeper meanings, not a situation of choosing between bad options.

The main idea here is the structure of a story's plot arc. After the climax, the story moves into the falling action, where the consequences of the turning point unfold and the tension eases as the plot heads toward resolution. This part ties up loose ends, resolves subplots, and shows how characters are affected by what happened at the climax. It's what comes after the high point and before the ending. Rising action builds toward the climax, and the entire sequence of events is the plot, while anecdotes are unrelated short tales and don't describe this portion of the arc.

Arranging events from earliest to latest is the idea being tested. The term for this kind of ordering is chronological order. It helps you follow the sequence of what happened and when, like a timeline that moves in time from the first event to later ones. Glossary is a list of definitions, not a sequence of events; a quotation is a person's exact words, and setting refers to where and when a story takes place, not the order in which events occur. So the best term for describing an arrangement of events by time is chronological order.

Understanding inference means recognizing that sometimes what a text lets you determine isn't stated outright, but is a conclusion you reach by looking at clues and using what you already know. The true statement captures this: an inference is a conclusion drawn from evidence in the text that isn't stated explicitly. You're using hints the author provides—descriptions, actions, dialogue, or events—to decide what those hints imply. For example, if a scene describes a character shivering, pulling on a coat, and glancing at a dark sky, you can infer that it's cold outside or that rain might be coming, even though the text doesn't say "it is cold" or "rain is approaching." The inference rests on concrete details plus your reasoning. Inference isn't the same as summarizing, which would simply restate the main ideas in fewer words; it's about drawing a new understanding from clues. It's also broader than just predicting, since predicting is one type of inference, but inference can also reveal characters' feelings, motives, or past events based on evidence. So the statement that accurately describes inference is that it's a conclusion drawn from evidence in the text that isn't explicitly stated.

Myths are traditional stories that use gods, supernatural beings, or magical events to explain natural phenomena and human customs. An epic, on the other hand, is a long narrative about a heroic figure and their adventures, not primarily focused on explaining nature. A parody is a humorous imitation of another work, and a parallel plot is a storytelling structure with two or more plots occurring at the same time.

A short story is a concise fictional work intended to be read in a single sitting. Because of that brevity, the writer concentrates on a meaningful moment, incident, or character interaction so readers can experience the whole story in one sitting. In contrast, a novel is much longer and broad in scope, often developing multiple subplots, various settings, and a larger cast of characters over many chapters. A literary journal is a periodical that publishes a mix of works—poems, short prose, and essays—not a single narrative piece by itself. A figure of speech is a rhetorical device used in language, such as a metaphor or simile, and it's not a narrative work at all. So the term that best fits "a concise fictional work intended to be read in a single sitting" is the short story.

7. Which narrative point of view can read the thoughts of many characters?

The idea being tested is who can reveal the inner thoughts of multiple characters. That capability comes from a narrator who knows everything about all the characters, not just one. This kind of narrator is third person omniscient. With third person omniscient, the storytelling voice isn't limited to a single character's mind. It can dip into the thoughts, feelings, and motives of many characters, switch between them, and provide a broader view of what's happening. That lets readers understand how different people are thinking and why they act the way they do, even when those thoughts contradict each other. In contrast, first person is told from one character's point of view and typically reveals only that character's inner life. Second person addresses the reader as "you," which isn't about multiple characters' thoughts. Third person limited follows one character closely, sharing that one character's thoughts rather than those of several. So, when a narrative lets you read the thoughts of many characters, the narrator is third person omniscient.

8. What is the main idea of a passage?

The main idea is the central message the author is getting across, built from the details and examples that appear throughout the passage. It's the big claim or point that ties all the information together, and the details are there to support that claim. That's why the best answer identifies the central point the author is making, supported by key details. A sentence that summarizes the entire text is a way to condense what's said, not the underlying message itself. The author's favorite hobby has no bearing on the author's overall message. And describing the order of events focuses on structure or sequence, not on the main point the author is trying to convey.

9. Which term describes a major category of literature such as poetry or novel?

Genre describes a major category of literature. It groups works that share characteristics such as form, style, and purpose. Poetry and novels are examples of genres because they indicate the kind of reading experience you can expect—poetry often uses condensed, musical language and imagery, while a novel presents an extended narrative with characters and events. The other terms refer to parts inside a work: a character is a person in the story, the plot is what happens, and the setting is where and when the action takes place. These elements exist within a work, but they don't name the broad category that includes poetry and novels.

Words that signal a result or effect show when one idea leads to another outcome. Therefore is a clear cue that what follows is the consequence of what came before. For example: "The team trained all week; therefore, they won the game." Here, the second clause states the result that comes from the prior effort. Why this fits best: it directly marks a conclusion or outcome derived from earlier information, making the relationship explicit. Why the others don't fit as well: because explains why something happened, focusing on the cause rather than the outcome that follows. And simply adds more information without signaling a consequence. If introduces a condition under which something will happen, not the result itself.
