This question tests understanding of who writes a life story and how much of a life is covered. When someone writes about their own life in their own words, using "I" and "my" to recount events from childhood onward, that's an autobiography. It presents the author's life story directly from their perspective, often as a chronological account of personal experiences. A biography, by contrast, tells about a person but is written by someone else. A memoir focuses on a specific period or set of experiences within the author's life, rather than the full life story. A novel is a work of fiction with invented characters and events. So the term for a life story written by the person themselves is autobiography.

2. The act of drawing a conclusion from clues in a text is called what?

Inferring is drawing conclusions from clues in a text by combining what the author hints with what you already know. It's like reading between the lines. The author provides hints—like actions, dialogue, expressions, or details about a situation—that point to a feeling, motive, or outcome that isn't stated outright. Using those clues plus your knowledge, you figure out what's really going on. For example, if a character says little, avoids eye contact, and leaves a room when a topic comes up, you can infer they are uncomfortable or guilty, even though the text doesn't say that directly. Prediction would be guessing what will happen next, not what's already implied. A summary restates main ideas, and analysis breaks parts apart to see how they fit. So the best term for drawing conclusions from clues is inference.

Understanding common prefixes helps you unlock word meanings quickly. The prefix anti- means against or opposite. When you see a word starting with anti-, think of opposing what comes next. For instance, antibacterial fights against bacteria; antifreeze prevents freezing; antisocial describes behavior that goes against social interaction. So the intended meaning is Against. The other options don't fit because for signals support or in favor, which is the opposite of anti-, and before or after refer to time or sequence rather than opposition.

Think about writing that mainly shares facts, explanations, or information in a straightforward, informative way. A piece designed to inform with evidence, data, and sometimes sources is called an article. You'd find articles in newspapers, magazines, and websites, built to educate readers about a topic or event. A memoir, in contrast, focuses on the author's own life stories and memories, with personal reflection rather than just presenting facts. Real Experiences isn't a standard label for a writing type, and Main Idea refers to the central point of a paragraph or passage, not a kind of writing. So the term that best fits a piece of writing that provides factual information is article.

Meticulous describes someone who pays close attention to details and is thorough in their work, aiming for precision. That makes "careful and precise" the best fit because it directly expresses both carefulness and exactness. The other terms describe opposite traits: careless means not paying attention, sloppy indicates rough or imprecise work, and indifferent suggests a lack of concern. When someone acts with meticulous care, they double-check measurements, organize steps, and ensure every detail is correct.

Prosody is the overall rhythm, stress, and intonation of spoken language in poetry. It governs how a poem sounds when read aloud and how that sound conveys meaning and feeling. Meter is the formal pattern of stressed and unstressed syllables that creates a regular beat, and cadence refers to the natural rise and fall of voice as you speak. Rhythm describes the pattern of sounds and stresses in a line as well, but prosody lets you consider how those elements—along with pitch and intonation—work together to shape a poem's effect. Because the prompt combines rhythm, stress, and intonation, this concept is the best fit.

Convince is about causing someone to believe or accept something by presenting reasons or evidence. That's exactly what it means to persuade someone. Deter means to discourage someone from taking a particular action, pushing them away from the idea rather than toward it. Confuse means to make someone unclear or puzzled, which doesn't involve changing belief in a positive way. Ignore means to pay no attention at all, which is the opposite of trying to persuade someone. So, when you're looking for a word that means to persuade someone, you're looking for convince.

8. Which term means when something stands for or represents a bigger idea?

Symbolism is when something stands for a bigger idea beyond its literal meaning. In stories, objects, colors, or characters can symbolize abstract concepts like love, freedom, or courage. For example, a storm might symbolize inner turmoil, or a dove might symbolize peace. Using symbols invites readers to read between the lines and uncover meanings beyond what's directly stated. The other terms describe different parts of a text: theme is the message about life the author conveys, reliable sources refer to trustworthy information, and the main idea is the central point the text is making. Symbolism best fits the description of representing a bigger idea.

9. Which strategy uses surrounding words to figure out the meaning of an unfamiliar word?

Using context clues means figuring out an unfamiliar word by looking at the surrounding words and ideas in the sentence or paragraph. The surrounding words often hint the meaning directly, show contrasts, or provide synonyms or examples that clarify what the word means. For example, if a sentence says, "The hike was arduous, with steep climbs and long days," you can infer that arduous means difficult or strenuous from the context. This strategy is about how the word is used in context, not about the word's parts by themselves. Prefixes, suffixes, and roots, on the other hand, give clues from the word's construction rather than from the rest of the sentence, so they serve a different purpose.

10. Which term describes a smaller title under the main title that tells what the text is about?

The term you're looking for is subheading. A subheading sits under the main title and gives a more specific hint about what the upcoming section will cover. It helps you navigate the text by signaling the focus of each part, without describing the overall message of the entire piece. Think of the main title as giving the broad topic of the whole text, while a subheading named under it tells you what that particular section will discuss. This is different from an article, which is the whole piece of writing; a memoir, which is a personal narrative about someone's life; and the main idea, which is the central point the author wants you to take away after reading the whole text.
