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Explanations

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1. Which term describes a life story written by the person themselves?

A. Autobiography

B. Biography

C. Memoir

This question tests understanding of who writes a life story and how much of a life is covered. When someone writes about their own life in their own words, using "I" and "my" to recount events from childhood onward, that's an autobiography. It presents the author's life story directly from their perspective, often as a chronological account of personal experiences. A biography, by contrast, tells about a person but is written by someone else. A memoir focuses on a specific period or set of experiences within the author's life, rather than the full life story. A novel is a work of fiction with invented characters and events. So the term for a life story written by the person themselves is autobiography.

2. Which word is a close synonym for 'thrifty'?

Thrifty means using money and resources carefully and avoiding waste. Economical captures that idea precisely: it describes someone who makes smart, cost-conscious choices and gets good value without overspending. In practice, being thrifty might involve shopping sales, comparing prices, and planning purchases to save money, which is exactly what being economical emphasizes. The other words describe different faults: wasteful points to spending a lot and wasting resources; extravagant suggests spending far more than is necessary; careless implies a lack of attention or concern, not necessarily about money. So the closest synonym is economical.

3. The main idea of an essay or argument is called what?

The main idea being tested is the thesis: the clear, specific claim that states what the essay is arguing or proving. The thesis sets the purpose and direction for the whole piece, so every paragraph and piece of evidence ties back to it. A strong thesis is debatable and concise, guiding the reader to what will be supported with reasons and evidence. For example, in a persuasive essay about uniforms, the thesis might say that requiring uniforms improves discipline and academic focus, and the rest of the essay would provide reasons and data to back that up. While a key idea can be an important point in the text, it's not necessarily the central claim of the whole argument; structure refers to how the essay is organized, not to the claim itself.

Cause and effect is about a link where one thing happening makes another thing happen. The best description is that one event leads to another outcome, showing how the first event (the cause) brings about the second event (the effect). For example, turning on a heater can cause the room to warm up. If two events occur independently, they aren't connected in a way that one causes the other. A sequence that repeats identically describes a pattern or repetition, not a cause-and-effect relationship. A statement of fact without consequences doesn't demonstrate any result that follows from something else.

5. The part of a text that introduces information necessary to understand what follows is called what?

Exposition is the part of a text that provides the background and necessary setup so you can understand what comes next. It introduces the setting, the characters, and the initial situation, laying out the information readers need to follow the story or argument. Think of it as the opening groundwork that makes the rest of the text make sense. For example, in a story, the exposition might tell where and when the events take place and who the main characters are, so you know why the ensuing actions matter. In an essay or article, it might present the topic and key terms or context, so readers understand the upcoming points. Background information is related, but the formal term used for this introductory material in fiction and nonfiction is exposition. Narration refers to the telling of events themselves, and a conclusion is the ending that wraps things up.

Meticulous describes someone who pays close attention to details and is thorough in their work, aiming for precision. That makes "careful and precise" the best fit because it directly expresses both carefulness and exactness. The other terms describe opposite traits: careless means not paying attention, sloppy indicates rough or imprecise work, and indifferent suggests a lack of concern. When someone acts with meticulous care, they double-check measurements, organize steps, and ensure every detail is correct.

7. Which word is a common signal for cause-and-effect relationships?

Cause-and-effect cues in writing help you see how one idea leads to another. Therefore signals that what follows is the result of what came before, making the relationship between ideas clear. When you read a sentence like "The storm knocked out power; therefore, the game was canceled," the word therefore shows that the second part follows from the first as a consequence. The other options hint at different relationships: however and but indicate contrast or a shift in thought, not a result; meanwhile points to actions happening at the same time, not a consequence. So therefore is the best choice because it directly marks a conclusion or outcome driven by earlier information.

A playwright is the person who writes a play. This term names the author who creates the script, including the dialogue and any stage directions that guide performance. Dialogue is the spoken words between characters, scene is a specific part of the action usually occurring in a particular place and time, and setting describes the overall time and place of the story. So, the creator of the play is the playwright.

9. Which term describes the use of symbols to represent larger ideas or themes?

Symbolism is the literary device that uses symbols—objects, colors, or actions—to stand for larger ideas or themes beyond their literal meaning. By giving something concrete a symbolic meaning, an author can convey complex messages without stating them outright. For example, a dove can symbolize peace, or a journey can symbolize growth or a turning point. This differs from theme, which is the underlying message about life or human experience; from a subheading, which just labels sections; and from the main idea, which is the central point the author is making. Symbolism specifically describes using symbols to represent bigger ideas or themes.

10. In the sentence 'The proposal was ambitious and the team was confident it would succeed,' what does the word 'ambitious' most nearly mean?

- A. Lacking effort

Ambitious describes aiming high, having big goals, or a strong drive to achieve something challenging. In the sentence, calling the proposal ambitious signals that it is bold and seeks a significant accomplishment. The team's confidence that it would succeed supports this sense, showing they're pursuing something demanding rather than easy. It doesn't mean lacking effort, temporary, or uncertain. The context suggests bold, high-reaching plans rather than something short-lived, doubtful, or lazy. So the best meaning is having strong goals or a strong desire to achieve something challenging.
