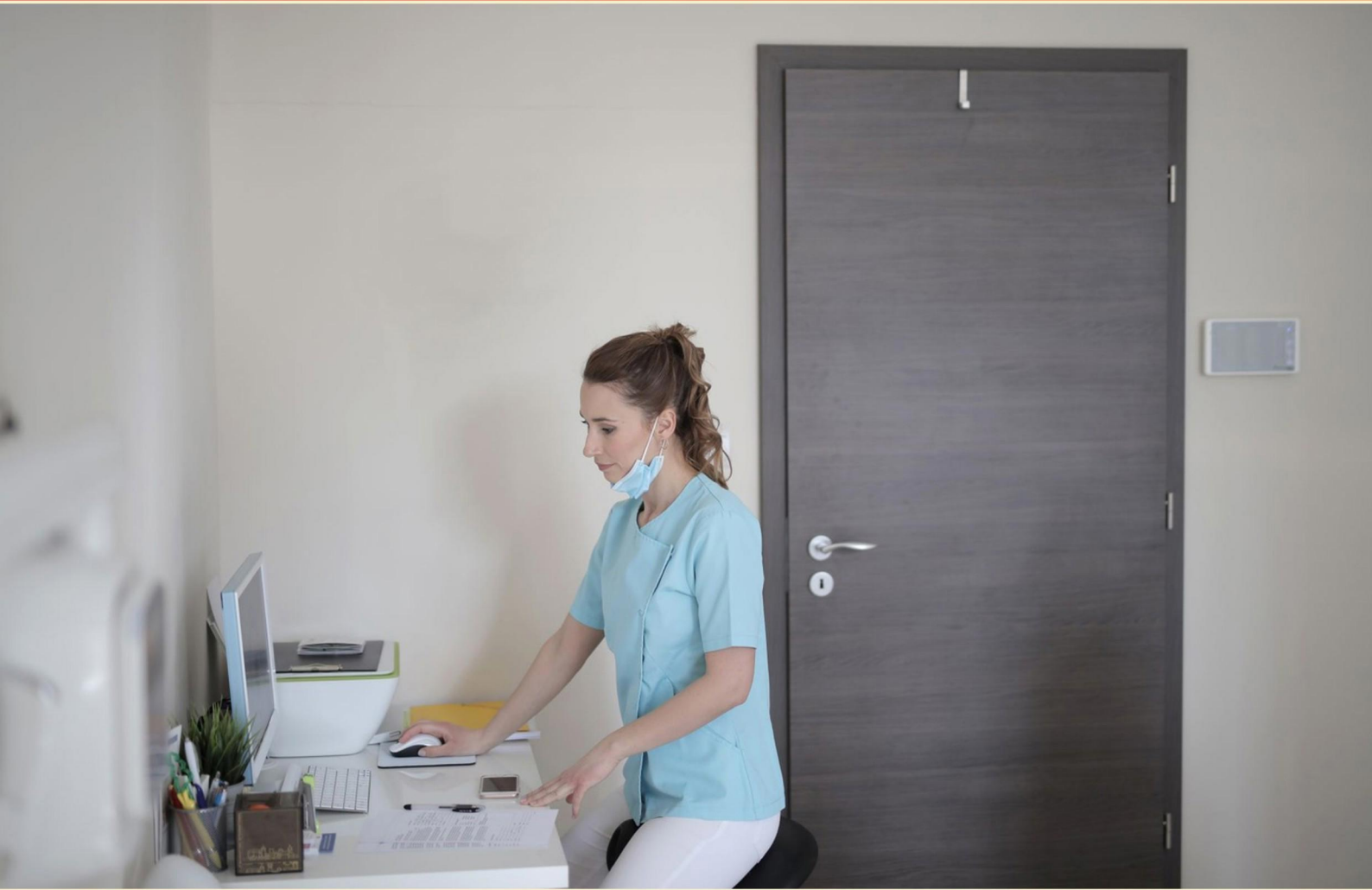

Providing a warm compress may offer comfort but does not directly address the underlying respiratory issue and is not a suitable intervention for managing shortness of breath.
