Rationalism centers on reason and evidence as the foundation of knowledge, which can also coexist with religious beliefs, making it less directly related to the idea of

However, his rejection of alliances with civil governments was clear and fundamental to his theological stance, underlining a commitment to a distinct understanding of the roles of church and state.

Other outcomes, such as a decline in educational institutions or restrictions on access to educational materials, were contrary to the direction that the Reformation took regarding education, as was the idea of focusing solely on classical texts without integrating religious teachings and literacy.

Instead, the Magna Carta seeks to constrain that power rather than celebrate or reinforce it, making the idea of monarchical power a theme not emphasized within the text.
