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Explanations

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1. Which term describes a gesture that has a deliberate meaning?

Deliberate meaning in a gesture comes from intentional communication. A gesture that conveys a specific message is purposeful because the person performing it intends the recipient to interpret a particular idea or signal. If a gesture is random, there's no planned message behind it. A distracting gesture aims to pull attention but isn't defined by conveying a clear, intended meaning. Attitude reflects mood or stance and can influence how a gesture is read, but it isn't the message the gesture itself communicates. So the term that best fits is purposeful. For example, a wave hello or a thumbs-up are purposeful because they are used with the clear intention of signaling greeting or approval.

When misinformation spirals on social media, the best approach is to respond quickly with factual corrections drawn from credible sources, and to avoid actions that amplify the false content. Quick corrections interrupt the spread while attention is high, making the truth more likely to be seen before the rumor hardens. Citing credible sources helps people judge trustworthiness and makes the correction more persuasive than a generic claim. It's important not to repeat or showcase the misinformation itself beyond what's necessary to debunk it, since repeating it can unintentionally amplify reach. Pairing the correction with clear, concise messaging and accessible evidence improves understanding. Engaging trusted influencers or credible communities broadens reach and lends legitimacy, helping the corrected information circulate to audiences that might otherwise encounter the misinformation. Ignoring misinformation lets it take hold and continue to spread; waiting for perfect verification slows the response and allows the false narrative to entrench itself; blocking all discussion suppresses dialogue and can erode trust. So, fast, sourced corrections plus strategies to prevent amplification and involve credible voices is the most effective approach.

The best use keeps visuals accurate and uncluttered, with clear labels, appropriate scales, and context such as the baseline risk and time frame, so the viewer can interpret what the numbers mean in real terms. A common pitfall to avoid is using misleading scales, cherry-picking data, or adding so much detail that the message becomes cluttered and confusing. Visuals should illuminate the risk, not distort it, and always accompany concise explanation.

This context lets people plan better, compare options more realistically, and avoid acting on a false sense of precision. It's not about confusing readers, nor about hiding the most probable value; many presentations still include a central estimate alongside the range to indicate likely outcomes. It also doesn't replace base rates, which describe how often events occur and should be considered together with any range to inform sound decisions.

Decision-making in crisis and emergency risk communication proceeds under imperfect and incomplete information. Communicators update messages as evidence evolves, provide guidance that helps people act with the current understanding, and maintain credibility by avoiding overconfidence. Waiting for perfect certainty isn't practical in emergencies, and relying solely on assumptions or withholding information can erode trust and mislead the public.

This reduces numeracy-related confusion and helps people grasp base rates more accurately. For example, saying 1 in 100 people will experience a side effect gives a tangible sense of how common it is, which supports better judgment about the likelihood and its practical implications. It also makes it easier to compare different risks side by side. Percentages and probabilities, while precise, can be harder to interpret, especially for those with limited numeracy, and they can lead to misinterpretation or neglect of base rates. By presenting risk as natural frequencies, you anchor abstract numbers in a real-world frame, improving comprehension and decision-making.

Tactical risk is a domain-specific framing and doesn't denote the likelihood in general terms. So, probability best captures the idea of how likely a hazard is to occur under specified conditions.

In crisis leadership, Courage is the quality that lets you act decisively despite fear and uncertainty. It means making tough, timely decisions to protect people and uphold ethical standards, even when the outcomes are unclear or risky. That proactive stance helps stabilize the situation, communicates resolve, and motivates others to follow your lead. While honesty in communication (candor) and genuine concern for others (compassion) are valuable, Courage best captures the active, decisive response that the 3 Cs framework highlights in a crisis.
