Occupational therapy, on the other hand, focuses on enabling participation in daily activities and meaningful roles by teaching or adapting tasks such as dressing, bathing, cooking, cleaning, managing finances, and using assistive devices. OT also looks at adapting environments and routines to support independence and energy management. With that understanding, the statement that physical therapy involves restoration of function and occupational therapy helps the patient learn daily life skills is accurate. The other options mix up the roles—for example, daily life skills are not the primary focus of physical therapy, and restoration of function is not the sole domain of occupational therapy.
