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Explanations

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1. The time allotted for the PBE is equal to:

- A. 10 minutes
- B. 12 minutes

Time management in a scenario-based briefing exercise is being tested. The PBE is set to fifteen minutes, giving just enough time to read the scenario, identify priorities, and apply the correct procedures while maintaining a realistic pace. This duration mirrors the need to process information quickly and act decisively in a smoke or fire situation, without rushing or over-deliberating. Shorter times would leave insufficient opportunity to cover all steps; longer times would reduce the pressure that ensures decisions are made promptly.

2. How do you remove oxygen from a fire?

- A. By smothering**

The idea here is depriving the flame of the air it needs to burn. Smothering works by covering the fire or sealing off the area so that little to no air reaches the flame, effectively removing the oxygen it relies on and causing the fire to go out. Cooling reduces heat but doesn't take away the oxygen, so it's not about removing air. Starving eliminates fuel, not oxygen. Ventilating would bring in more air, which would feed the fire rather than starve it. So the best way to remove oxygen from a fire is smothering.

During an evacuation, communication must be rapid and unambiguous. Clear, concise, and standardized commands provide precise instructions that are understood instantly regardless of stress or cabin noise, reducing confusion and speeding up the crew's coordinated actions at exits. This consistent language helps everyone know exactly what to do and when to do it, which is crucial when every second counts. Ambiguous or confusing language can cause hesitation and wrong actions, shouting alone may be drowned out or misheard, and written-only directions are impractical when immediate vocal guidance is needed. So, using clear, concise, and standardized commands keeps the evacuation orderly and safe.

Fire needs three things to keep burning: heat to raise the temperature, fuel to feed the flame, and oxygen to sustain the chemical reaction. Water isn't one of these elements; it acts as a cooling agent that lowers heat and can also smother the flame by separating fuel from heat. So water is not an element of fire, while heat, fuel, and oxygen are.

5. Class B corresponds to which type of material?

- A. Flammable Solids
- B. Flammable Liquids**
- C. Flammable Gases
- D. Live Electrical Equipment

Fires are categorized by the fuel involved, and Class B is the label for flammable liquids. These liquids burn by releasing vapors that form an ignitable mixture, and they can spread across surfaces, so they often require extinguishing methods that blanket and cool the liquid rather than trying to smother a solid or chase a gas. Foam, dry chemical, or CO2 are effective because they cool and separate the fuel from the fire, preventing reignition. Examples include jet fuel, gasoline, kerosene, solvents, alcohols, and oils found on aircraft. This differs from solids like wood or paper (which are Class A) and from gases (another fire class), so the material type described by Class B is flammable liquids.

6. What should you prioritise for personal safety during a galley fire?

In a galley fire, personal safety and a clear exit path come first. Entering the galley to fight the fire right away exposes you to intense heat, smoke, and toxic fumes, which can trap you and prevent you from evacuating quickly. Venturing in to ventilate or search for the fire can worsen conditions and spread the fire by feeding it with more oxygen. Simply closing a door and waiting without ensuring a safe route out may leave you and others unable to escape in time. The best approach is to focus on getting to a safe exit path, help others evacuate if possible, and alert the crew. If you are trained and the situation is safe to do so, you may attempt to fight a small, contained fire with the proper equipment, but never at the expense of your own safety or the ability to evacuate. This balance—protecting yourself, securing a route out, and applying fire-fighting only when trained and safe—is what reduces risk during a galley fire.

Providing assistance and guiding to the nearest exit, with staff support, is essential. In an evacuation, passengers with disabilities may need tailored help to reach safety for a smooth and timely escape. Trained crew can assess needs, communicate clearly, and physically guide or accompany the passenger as required, ensuring they reach the exit promptly and safely while maintaining dignity. Leaving someone unaided, only talking without offering help, or moving them to the end of the line risks delays, confusion, and possible harm for that person and others.

8. How should you respond if multiple fires occur?

When multiple fires are present, safety hinges on getting people away from danger first and organizing a clear response. Evacuation swiftly removes passengers and crew from heat, smoke, and potential collapse, which is the highest priority over trying to fight multiple fires. Delegating tasks ensures the team covers important actions efficiently—one person handles alarms and communication, another guides people to exits, and others manage doors, counts, and potential evacuations of specific areas. Informing the Person in Charge establishes a single point of command to coordinate actions, activate procedures, and request additional help if needed. Following established emergency procedures keeps everyone's actions aligned with training, reducing confusion and delaying mistakes. Waiting or ignoring fires can increase risk, while a coordinated, safety-first response minimizes exposure and injury.

Informing first ensures the right people are alerted and the response is coordinated. Identifying the fire's location and scope quickly guides the appropriate action and avoids wasted effort. Preparation then follows so the crew can ready the correct equipment, secure areas, and assign roles before any suppression begins. Attacking the fire comes after informing, identifying, and preparing, ensuring suppression is applied safely and effectively. Finally, control focuses on containing the fire, maintaining safe conditions, and coordinating with authorities and passengers until the situation is secure.

10. What should be avoided with damaged equipment after a fire?

After a fire, damaged equipment can hide serious hazards such as live electrical components, hot surfaces, and chemical residues. Handling or touching it can cause injury or spread contaminants, and it can also destroy evidence needed to understand the fire's cause. The best approach is to avoid touching the equipment at all, document its condition and location (for example with photos and notes), and report it to the appropriate authorities or safety officers so trained personnel can assess, secure, and preserve evidence. Moving or discarding the equipment without reporting can create additional risks and obstruct the investigation.
