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Explanations

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1. Which OmniScript element is used to add a warning banner?

- A. Text Block
- B. DataRaptor
- C. Messaging Element**
- D. Integration Procedure

Showing messages to the user within an OmniScript flow is what the Messaging Element is designed for. When you need a warning banner to appear, this element renders a banner-style message on the page and can indicate severity such as warning or error. It lets you present dynamic text—tied to variables or validation results—so the banner reflects the current state of the input or process. A Text Block would only display static text and isn't meant to surface contextual banners or alerts. DataRaptor handles data extraction and transformation, not user messaging. An Integration Procedure is a backend process and doesn't render UI elements. So, for adding a warning banner that appears in response to conditions in the OmniScript, the Messaging Element is the appropriate choice.

In OmniScripts, the Multiselect element is an input that lets users choose multiple items, appearing as a checklist of options with checkboxes. So the description that it allows one or more selections as a checklist best captures how this element works.

Caching outputs from the steps inside an Integration Procedure is what the IPD Cache Block does. It stores those results in a session or org cache so they can be retrieved quickly later, which speeds up future runs and reduces repeated processing or API calls. This highlights its role as a storage mechanism rather than something that clears data, passes data back to the caller, or automatically repeats steps.

4. Which syntax is used to denote merge codes in Vlocity OmniScript?

Merge codes in Vlocity OmniScript are denoted using percent signs around the field path, like %field%. This format tells OmniScript to substitute the actual value from the current data context at runtime, so the UI displays the real data instead of the placeholder. For example, %Contact.FirstName% will render the contact's first name once the data is loaded. Other forms such as using quotes around the field, or braces, are not recognized as merge codes by OmniScript and would appear as literal text rather than dynamic values. So the percent-delimited syntax is the correct way to reference dynamic data in OmniScript.

You can set a default option by marking the common use case as the Default in the Options section. Each option in a picklist, radio group, or similar control can carry a default flag, so the initial state reflects the most common scenario while still allowing users to change it if needed. The other options aren't accurate because defaults aren't limited to integration procedures, nor are they restricted to Global Settings; they're configured at the option level for the UI control.

The Done Action serves as the final step in an OmniScript's execution, so it belongs at the end of the flow. Placing it at the bottom of the Structure Panel ensures all preceding actions and steps complete before the script finishes. The Structure Panel lays out the run sequence, and the Done Action is the concluding instruction that runs last, which is why it sits at the bottom. It isn't inside each Step element, since those are the individual actions to execute in order, and it isn't found in Script Configuration, which holds settings rather than the execution flow.

7. What is the primary purpose of step elements in OmniScript?

The main idea is that a step in OmniScript serves as the UI canvas for that stage of the flow. The Step element is the container that renders one screen of the user journey and hosts all the interactive elements—such as inputs, prompts, and actions—that users interact with at that point. It defines what the user sees and how they can proceed to the next part of the flow, while the data collection and logic are handled by the elements inside the step and surrounding flow configuration. So the Step's primary purpose is to provide the user-facing page for that step, making it the best fit for the answer.

Control Width sets how much horizontal space a control takes in the page's grid layout. The UI uses a 12-column grid, so the width is defined by a number from 0 to 12. A value of 0 hides the control. This property affects how controls line up and respond in the layout—allowing side-by-side placement or full-width display—without changing any data bindings, data sources, or the order of steps. For example, two fields can share a row by assigning each a width of 6; a control with width 12 fills the entire row; a control with width 0 is hidden.

9. Which OmniScript element allows multiple selections from a checklist?

Allowing users to pick several items from a list requires a control that supports multi-selection; in OmniScript, that is the Multiselect element. It presents a list of options with the ability to check multiple items and returns the selected values as a collection, which you can use downstream. The other options are intended for single selections only: Radio groups and dropdowns (Select) let the user choose one option, while a Checkbox represents a boolean choice (or a single checkbox, not a list of multiple selections). So for a checklist, the Multiselect is the right fit because it directly supports selecting multiple items and provides the data you need as an array of chosen values.

10. Which capability describes data integration from multiple sources within an OmniScript?

OmniScript is built to bring in data from several sources and actively shape it inside the flow. You can pull data from Salesforce, external REST services, or other endpoints using DataRaptor or Integration Procedures, then map, transform, and compute values within the script. This enables integrating data from multiple sources and manipulating it as the script runs, driving steps, validations, and outcomes based on the combined data. For example, you could fetch account details from Salesforce, obtain pricing from an external system, and then calculate a discount or build a response all within the same script. The other options don't fit because OmniScript isn't limited to local data, data can be transformed and manipulated, and you can read and write data through the appropriate actions.
