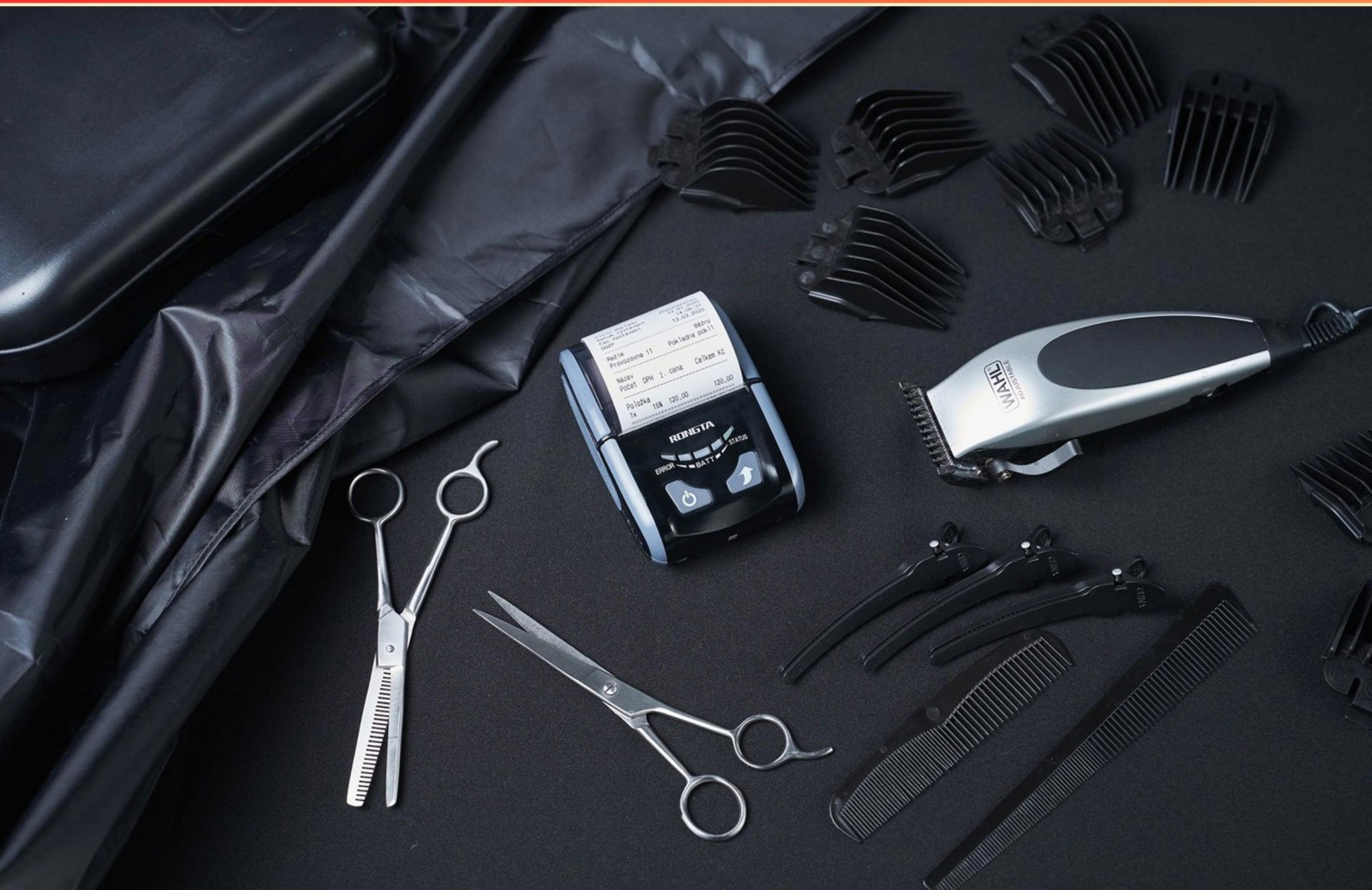

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Explanations

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1. _____ are not affected by antibiotics.

Antibiotics are made to interfere with processes that bacteria have, such as building their cell walls, making essential proteins with bacterial ribosomes, or carrying out specific bacterial enzymes. Viruses don't have those features: they're just genetic material inside a protein coat and they reproduce by hijacking a host cell's machinery. Because antibiotics don't target anything viral, they don't stop viruses from multiplying. That's why antiviral therapies, not antibiotics, are used for viral infections. For context, other options fit their own categories—fungi are targeted by antifungals, bacteria by antibiotics, and prions are abnormal proteins that aren't affected by standard antibiotics either—but the reason viruses stand out here is that their replication isn't dependent on the bacterial structures antibiotics attack.

The key idea is identifying the medical specialty that focuses on the skin. The other listed specialists focus on different areas: an oncologist treats cancer, including skin cancer, but not exclusively; a nephrologist treats kidney diseases; a psychiatrist treats mental health conditions. Disinfectants must have efficacy claims on the label because that tells you exactly what the product has been proven to kill and under what conditions. Those claims come from standardized tests and official registrations, so using the product as directed—following the stated contact time, dilution, and surfaces—will achieve the advertised level of disinfection. The label's efficacy information is what gives you confidence that the product will help prevent cross-contamination in a salon setting. Color, fragrance, and price are features or marketing aspects, not guarantees of disinfection performance.

This question tests which bloodborne virus damages the liver. Hepatitis viruses specifically target and inflame liver tissue, with hepatitis B and C being common viruses spread through blood exposure. HIV and AIDS relate to the immune system rather than the liver as the primary target, and herpes mainly affects skin and mucous membranes. The concept here is that some devices are designed as storage containers that use a sanitizing method, rather than being true disinfectants or sterilizers. A UV sanitizing box sits items inside and exposes their surfaces to ultraviolet-C light to reduce surface microbes. But because the light must reach every surface directly, shadows, crevices, and sealed areas may not be treated, and UV alone does not guarantee complete disinfection or sterilization. So the container itself isn't disinfecting or sterilizing in the same way steam or chemical disinfection would; it's a storage aid that can help reduce contamination when used correctly, not a standalone disinfection method. Steam, alcohol, and microwaves are methods that, when applied properly, actively disinfect or sterilize items rather than just store them. They're not storage containers, which is why ultraviolet—as a storage-container option that provides limited sanitizing effect—fits the described scenario.

This approach is essential to prevent exposure to staff and clients and to stay compliant with safety regulations. Contaminated items should go into leak-proof, closable containers or red biohazard bags, clearly labeled, and stored in a designated area until they're picked up by a licensed waste contractor or processed according to local rules. Regular trash isn't appropriate because it can put sanitation workers at risk and may spread pathogens. Reusing contaminated items after cleaning isn't acceptable because bloodborne pathogens can remain on surfaces and materials. Burning isn't a standard or permissible disposal method in typical salon settings and requires specialized facilities and permits.

Always keep disinfectants and other chemicals in clearly identified containers. If you put a product into an unmarked container, you can't tell what it is, what strength it is, or how long it needs to stay in contact. That uncertainty leads to misapplication, incorrect dilutions, spills, and accidental exposure, which can cause skin or eye irritation, chemical burns, or ineffective disinfection. The safety practice is to keep products in their original labeled containers, or in any transfer container that is clearly labeled with the product name, dilution or usage instructions, and hazard warnings. If you do transfer contents to another container, labeling is essential to avoid dangerous mistakes.

9. Which virus is described as asymptomatic for years and can be transmitted through blood and body fluids?

This question tests how long a virus can be present without symptoms and how it's spread through blood and body fluids. HIV is known for a long asymptomatic period—people can live for years with HIV before any AIDS-defining illness appears—while still being able to transmit the virus through blood, semen, vaginal fluids, rectal fluids, and breast milk. That combination of a lengthy asymptomatic phase and transmission via blood and body fluids is what makes HIV the best fit for this description. AIDS isn't a virus itself; it's the advanced stage of HIV disease. Hepatitis B can also be transmitted through blood and body fluids and can be asymptomatic, but the question's focus on a long asymptomatic period before transmission points most clearly to HIV. Herpes spreads mainly through close personal contact and skin-to-skin contact, not primarily through blood and body fluids in the way HIV does.

10. When salon implements accidentally contact blood, or body fluids, or unhealthy conditions, they should be cleaned and then completely immersed in an _____ or _____.

The key idea is that contaminated implements must be disinfected with a product proven to kill bloodborne pathogens. After cleaning away visible debris, fully immersing the tools in an EPA-registered hospital disinfectant or in a freshly prepared 10% bleach solution provides broad-spectrum disinfection that can neutralize pathogens such as HBV, HCV, and HIV. EPA-registered hospital disinfectants are labeled for use on instruments and surfaces and have proven efficacy, while a 10% bleach solution is a widely available, effective alternative when prepared correctly and used for the recommended contact time. Soap and water only cleans and doesn't guarantee disinfection. Alcohol-based sanitizers aren't reliable for disinfecting instruments, especially after exposure to blood or body fluids. UV light isn't practical for ensuring complete, uniform disinfection of all tool surfaces.
