Moreover, controlling WIP helps maintain quality, as it allows team members to concentrate on fewer tasks simultaneously. This focused attention can lead to better problem-solving and fewer errors since team members are not spread too thin across multiple activities. In essence, setting a cap on WIP supports the principles of lean thinking within SAFe, facilitating a more streamlined and effective workflow that ultimately contributes to business agility and improved time-to-market for products or services.
