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Explanations

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1. Which item is used to remove stitches from fabric?

- A. Seam ripper
- B. Scissors
- C. Needle

To undo stitching, you need a tool that cuts threads without damaging the surrounding fabric. A seam ripper is designed for this exact job: its slender, pointed tip slips under a stitch to lift it, and its small blade cuts the thread cleanly. This lets you undo seams precisely without creating holes in the fabric. Scissors can cut fabric or threads but aren't designed to work safely around stitches and can damage the material. A needle is used to sew, not to cut threads, so it doesn't remove stitches. Pinking shears are for finishing edges with a zigzag cut and aren't effective for removing stitched seams. So the seam ripper is the best choice for removing stitches.

Pattern layout is the process of arranging pattern pieces on the fabric before cutting, with attention to how the pieces align with the fabric's grain and how they fit together to use as much fabric as possible. This ensures the grain lines run in the correct direction and that each piece is oriented to produce the proper drape and fit. In practice, you place larger pieces first, rotate pieces to fit, and account for seam allowances and fabric direction (including nap or print direction) so nothing needs to be recut. Finishing raw edges, color matching, and the order of sewing steps are separate steps in construction, not the arrangement of pieces on fabric for cutting.

The term is bobbin. It's the small round spool that holds the bottom thread and sits in the bobbin case under the needle plate. The other items have different roles: the needle carries the top thread, the spool pin holds the thread spool on top, and the thread guide directs thread from the spool toward the needle. Understanding the bobbin helps explain how stitches are formed and why tension matters.

Grading seam allowances means trimming them to different widths along the seam to reduce bulk and help edges lie flat, especially where curves or multiple layers meet. When you keep a uniform width everywhere, bulky areas can bunch or show through; by grading—making some parts thinner than others—you minimize that bulk and keep the seam smooth and the fabric nesting correctly. Notching, by contrast, involves cutting small V-shaped wedges in the seam allowance to release fullness around curves, but it isn't about varying the width across the entire seam. Pressing is about heat-setting the seam to lie flat, and stitching is the actual sewing; neither adjusts seam allowance width. So the term for trimming to different widths is grading.

A facing is a fabric piece used to finish raw edges at necklines, armholes, or waistlines, giving the edge a clean, stable finish and helping it keep its shape. It's cut to match the edge and sewn on with the wrong sides together, then turned to the inside and secured—often with interfacing to add stiffness. This technique is used specifically where openings need a smooth, professional edge and some structure, especially on curves. It's different from a lining (which adds warmth or coverage inside the garment) and from decorative trims or general seam finishes.

Knitted fabrics are produced by forming yarns into interlocking loops. That looping structure lets the fabric bend and stretch, and then snap back into place, which is the elasticity you feel. The other terms refer to sewing actions or machine parts rather than how fabric is formed: seam allowance is extra fabric added at seams, place on fold tells you to cut along a fold line, and spool pin is a machine part that holds the thread spool.

Animal fibers vary a lot in how they behave under moisture and light. Silk, produced by silkworms, is exceptionally strong and resilient for a natural fiber, which is why it feels sturdy and holds shape well. At the same time, silk is a protein-based fiber that is sensitive to moisture and UV light. When silk gets wet, it can dry with uneven absorption or dye migration, leaving visible water marks on the fabric. And over time, exposure to the sun's rays breaks down the silk proteins, causing yellowing, weakening, and a loss of strength. These combined traits—great strength and resilience, plus vulnerability to water spots and aging from sun exposure—make silk the best fit for the description. Cotton and rayon aren't animal fibers, and wool, while strong, doesn't typically be described by water marks in the same way and ages differently under sun.

8. When the upper and lower bobbin threads interlock as the needle passes through the fabric, this is known as what?

Stitch formation is the process of the upper thread and bobbin thread interlocking to create a stitch as the needle passes through the fabric. In a typical lockstitch, the needle thread forms a loop that the bobbin thread catches from below, resulting in two threads interlacing securely. Proper tension on both threads helps this interlocking happen cleanly; if tension is off, you'll see loose loops or skipped stitches. The other terms relate to different aspects—thread tension describes how tight the threads pull, bobbin winding is about preparing the bobbin, and needle size affects fabric compatibility and penetration but not the actual interlocking that forms a stitch.

Backstitching locks the threads at the start and end of a seam to prevent unraveling. By stitching backward over the initial stitches and then continuing forward along the seam, you create tiny reverse stitches that anchor the thread turns, so the seam stays secure even if pulled or stressed. This purpose-built reinforcement is what makes backstitch the best choice for finishing seam ends. Overstitch runs along the edge to prevent fraying but doesn't lock the seam ends; tacking and basting are temporary holds for positioning fabric before final stitching.

Fabrics made without knitting or weaving are non-woven fabrics. They form by bonding fibers together with heat, moisture, and pressure (or other bonding methods) to create a cohesive sheet, without using interlaced yarns. This means there aren't warp and weft threads or looped yarns holding the fabric together—the fibers are held in place by bonding. Woven fabrics rely on interlacing yarns, with distinct warp and weft directions. Knit fabrics form through looping yarns to create a stretchy fabric. Lace is typically an openwork fabric created by weaving or crocheting to produce its delicate patterns. The bonding described—heat, moisture, and pressure—fits non-wovens, not weaving, knitting, or lace. Examples include felt and many disposable or medical products.
