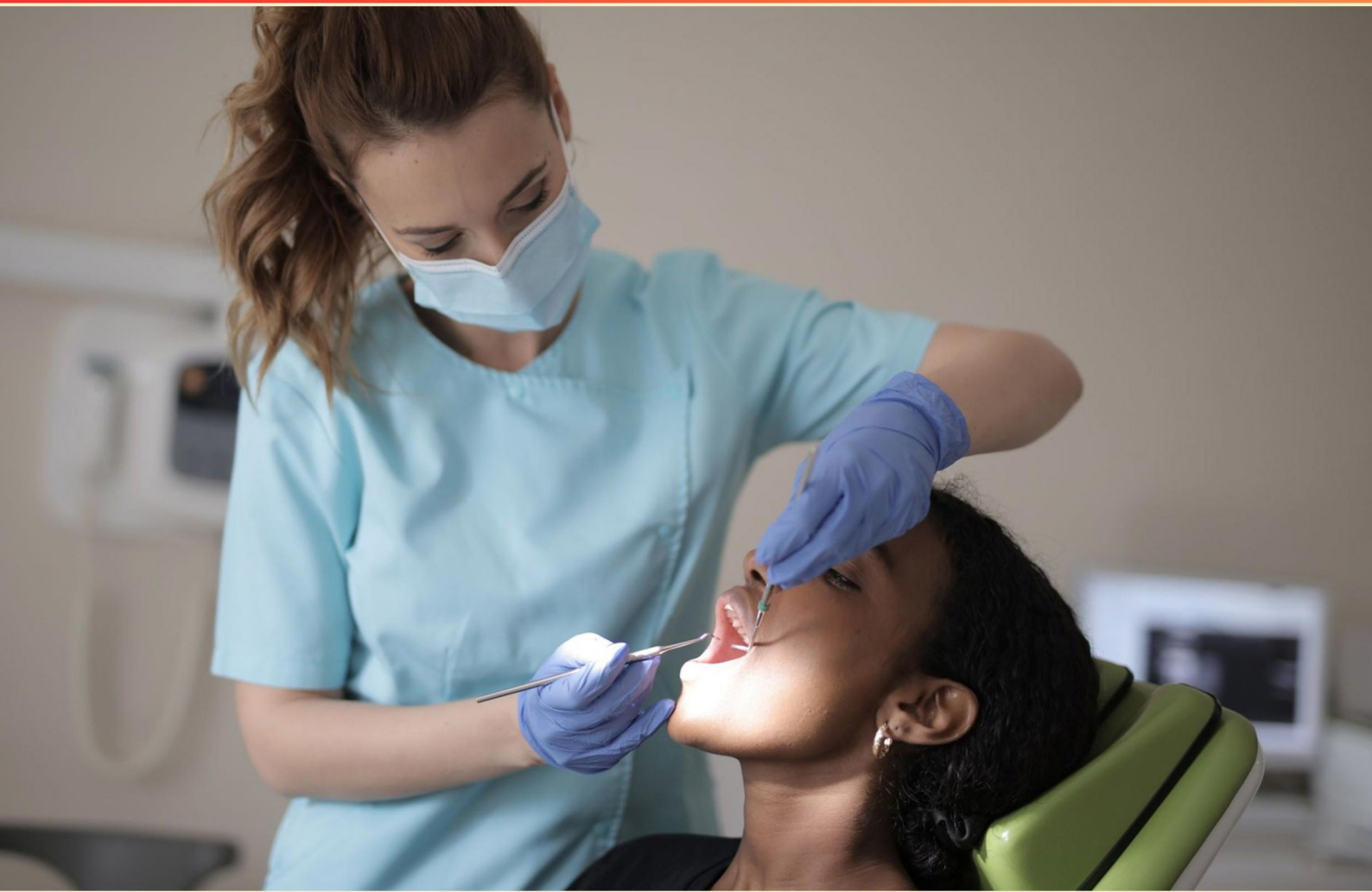

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Explanations

Thus, the primary function of a dental lab technician is specifically centered on crafting dental prosthetics and appliances in a laboratory setting.

Cephalometric X-rays are primarily used in orthodontics to analyze the relationship of the teeth to the bones and soft tissues of the face but do not provide a full view of the dental arches in a single image. Thus, the panoramic X-ray stands out as the most effective option for capturing a complete view of the mouth.
