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## **Explanations**

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**1. In a business meeting, which statement describes proper participation and rights?**

In meetings, a fair process means everyone can share ideas and have a voice, decisions are made in an organized, majority-supported way, and minority viewpoints are protected so all relevant perspectives are heard. This combination is what the best statement captures: every member has the right to express ideas, the group follows the majority's decision to move forward, and the rights of the minority are protected to ensure fairness and prevent sidelining important input. The other descriptions break this balance: letting the chair decide without input eliminates member participation; restricting expression only to the chair shuts down contributions from others; and letting the majority override minority rights undermines fairness and can silence valid concerns. When participation is open and rights are protected, decisions are both efficient and legitimate.

This modeling helps kids become more willing to sample new things, reduces food neophobia, and supports a balanced intake of nutrients as they see healthy options as part of a regular meal. It also helps establish a calm, predictable mealtime routine where meals are important and shared. Other approaches don't support this learning as effectively. Forbidding foods can create resistance and power struggles and doesn't teach how to enjoy a wide range of foods. Providing only snacks misses the opportunity to practice balanced meals. Dismissing mealtime as unimportant communicates that eating together isn't meaningful, which can hinder healthy eating habits and social development.

Items that belong in a portfolio include concrete projects and samples of work that show your teaching abilities, letters of recommendation that speak to your performance in real settings, and certificates or awards that verify your training and accomplishments. Therefore, vacation pictures don't belong in a professional portfolio because they don't communicate your qualifications or readiness to work with children.

Separation anxiety is a normal, developmentally expected response in young children. Offering a snack might distract or become a less reliable regulation cue and isn't consistently calming in the moment. Water play, used calmly and with supervision, is a gentle, constructive way to help a child cool down.
