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## **Explanations**

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**1. Which of the following is NOT typically included in an incident report?**

- A. Offense details
- B. Trial details**

An incident report is a factual record of what happened, when, where, and who was involved or observed. It includes offense details (the type of crime and relevant statutes), offender details (identity or physical description when known), victim and witness information, property or injuries, actions taken by responding personnel, and a narrative summary of the events. It does not contain trial details such as court dates, charges, plea information, or trial outcomes, because those belong to the legal process that follows the incident and are documented in court filings and case files. So, trial details are not typically included in an incident report.

**2. Which of the following best describes labeling of biohazards involving materials such as hypodermic needles and bloodstained clothing?**

Labeling of biohazards is about warning that an item may contain infectious material. Hypodermic needles and bloodstained clothing both can carry bloodborne pathogens, so they should be labeled as biohazards to alert responders and ensure proper handling, PPE, and disposal. Gunshot residue, meanwhile, is a chemical residue rather than a biological contaminant, so it isn't classified as a biohazard in the same way. Therefore, marking both needles and bloodstained clothing as biohazards best reflects the potential biological risk.

Controlling and releasing a crime scene is the lead investigator's responsibility. On arrival, this person takes charge of on-scene operations, ensures all evidence is properly documented, collected, labeled, and logged, and confirms that the scene has been processed before letting it be cleared. This authority comes from coordinating the investigation and preserving the integrity of the evidence and chain of custody. The first responding officer secures the area and preserves conditions, but does not authorize release. The medical examiner handles the body and determines cause of death, often coordinating the body's removal, but does not decide when the scene is released. The detective supervisor provides oversight, but the on-scene lead investigator is the one who makes the release decision based on the completion of processing and documentation.

The key idea is that trace evidence describes material that moves between objects when they touch. This transfer is the essence of trace evidence and is what investigators look for to link a person, object, and location. Impression evidence involves the imprint or mark left by an object on a surface, not the transfer of materials. Toolmark evidence concerns marks left by tools on surfaces. Hair and fibers are examples of trace evidence, but the broader category that captures the transfer during contact is trace evidence.

Ethics codes in policing emphasize avoiding anything that could appear to sway judgment. Refusing gifts or favors demonstrates commitment to doing what's right even when something tempting is offered. Maintaining equal treatment ensures fairness and that no person receives special consideration. Telling the truth is essential for honesty and accountability; without truthfulness, trust and justice suffer. Thus, accepting gifts or favors is the choice most misaligned with police ethics.

Breathable packaging helps preserve bone evidence by allowing any residual moisture to evaporate and preventing mold or microbial growth that could alter the sample. A paper bag is preferred because it is porous, lightweight, and easy to label, keeping bones dry during transport. Plastic bags trap moisture and can promote deterioration; glass jars are heavy, fragile, and also trap moisture; cardboard boxes may not protect small fragments from movement or contamination. The goal is to maintain the bone's condition as closely as possible during collection and transit, and breathable paper achieves that effectively.

The protection against unreasonable searches and seizures comes from the Fourth Amendment. It safeguards a person's privacy by requiring that searches and seizures be reasonable, usually grounded in probable cause and, for most searches, authorized by a warrant that specifically describes the place to be searched and the items to be seized. This framework ensures investigators have a lawful basis for collecting evidence and prevents unchecked government intrusion. There are recognized exceptions to the warrant requirement—such as exigent circumstances, consent, or searches conducted in certain situations—but even those exceptions are judged against the standard of reasonableness. The other amendments listed cover different rights (for example, freedom of speech or religious practice, rights in criminal prosecutions, or protection against cruel and unusual punishment), so they do not describe the protection against unreasonable searches and seizures.

The person on whom a crime was committed is the victim. In law enforcement, the victim is the individual who suffers harm, loss, or injury as a result of the criminal act, or who is specifically targeted by the crime. The suspect is the person believed to have committed the crime and is the focus of the investigation as a potential offender. The perpetrator is the offender who actually commits the crime, which can be the same person as the suspect. The witness is someone who observed the crime or has information about it, not the person harmed. So the term for the described role is the victim.

The key idea is how courts measure police use of force. *Graham v. Connor* established that claims of excessive force are judged under the Fourth Amendment's objective reasonableness standard. This means evaluating whether the officer's conduct was reasonable from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene, given the totality of the circumstances at the time, rather than judging with the benefit of hindsight. It emphasizes real-time conditions: the threat level, the seriousness of the suspected offense, whether the suspect posed an imminent danger, and whether there were feasible, less-lethal options available. Deadly force is permissible only when necessary to protect the officer or others from serious, imminent harm. For context, *Terry v. Ohio* deals with reasonable suspicion for stops and frisks, *Mapp v. Ohio* addresses the exclusionary rule and state incorporation, and *Miranda v. Arizona* concerns interrogation rights.

Real evidence is a tangible object from the scene that can be seen, touched, and analyzed. A piece of fabric fits this perfectly because it is a physical item that can be examined for fibers, DNA, or other trace evidence and can be handled with a documented chain of custody. Testimonial testimony is a statement given by a person, which is not a physical item. Records are written or recorded documents, a different category of evidence. Hearsay refers to an out-of-court statement offered to prove truth, which concerns admissibility rather than a physical object. So the fabric is the best example of real evidence because it is a measurable, examinable material item.
