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Explanations

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1. Arresting a suspect without a warrant of arrest may tantamount to which of the following?

- A. Misdemeanor
- B. Malfeasance**
- C. Excessive force

The key idea here is accountability for wrongful official actions. Arresting someone without proper legal authority or justification shows misuse of authority by a public official. Malfeasance specifically covers illegal or wrongful acts carried out by someone in an official capacity, such as making an arrest without a warrant when there isn't lawful basis or without the proper exceptions. While warrantless arrests can be legal in certain situations (like having probable cause or exigent circumstances), doing so without justification is improper and can amount to malfeasance. A misdemeanor is just a type of crime and doesn't describe the officer's conduct. Excessive force concerns how the arrest is carried out, not whether the arrest itself was legally authorized. A legal arrest is the goal, meaning lawful authority and justification are present, which isn't the case in the scenario described.

Ethics in policing is the set of moral principles that guide how officers should behave given the authority and trust placed in them. The special responsibility to adhere to moral duty in police work centers on maintaining integrity, fairness, respect for rights, and accountability in every action. Police ethics specifically captures this focus on moral obligations within the context of policing, guiding decisions in tough situations, such as reporting misconduct, avoiding corruption, and treating all individuals with dignity. The other terms are broader or more about procedures than moral duty. Public service ethics refers to ethics in serving the public in general, not the distinct moral standards of law enforcement. Civil duty describes a general civic obligation, not a professional standard for officers. Professional protocol emphasizes rules and procedures rather than the ethical obligations that underlie those actions.

In juvenile court, the document filed alleging that a juvenile is delinquent, a status offender, or a dependent and asking the court to assume jurisdiction is a juvenile petition. This filing starts the case, lays out the specific allegations, and requests that the court exercise its authority over the juvenile for delinquency, status offenses, or dependency. It functions similarly to a charging document in adult court but is specifically designed for the juvenile system. Indictments are used in adult felony cases and involve a grand jury; a warrant is a court order for arrest or search; a complaint is another type of charging document used in adult cases. The juvenile petition is what initiates jurisdiction and drives the ensuing proceedings in juvenile court.

4. Felonies sentencing is heard in which court?

Felonies are the most serious offenses and require a trial in a court with broad jurisdiction to handle them. In many jurisdictions, that court is the circuit court, which has original jurisdiction over felonies and is responsible for conducting the trial and, if there is a conviction, imposing the sentence within the statutory guidelines. The other courts serve different purposes: municipal courts handle city ordinance violations and misdemeanors; district courts (where that term is used) typically deal with less serious matters or preliminary proceedings; and the supreme court is an appellate court that reviews decisions after trials, not the venue for sentencing felonies. So the sentencing of felonies is done in the circuit court.

5. If a potential bomb or other major threat is identified, which response is appropriate?

Coordinated response with trained specialists is essential when a potential bomb or major threat is identified. This requires experts with bomb-disposal training, protective equipment, and established procedures to assess the device, secure the area, and manage the incident. Calling agencies trained in handling the threat ensures the right team—bomb disposal or explosive ordnance disposal—arrives quickly to evaluate the risk and guide any necessary evacuations or sheltering, in coordination with other emergency services. Handling it yourself or delaying contact puts people at serious risk and can worsen the situation. In short, notify emergency services and request the appropriate trained threat-response teams.

6. At night time, it is important to shine the spotlight where?

Shining the spotlight toward the driver's side mirror and into the center of the vehicle provides visibility where it matters most for safety and threat assessment. This angle lights up the interior, letting you see the driver's hands and any movements, as well as what's on the center console or in the back seats, so you can quickly gauge risk. The driver's side mirror helps reveal actions that might not be visible from a straight-on view, giving you early warning of reaching for a weapon or other danger. Lighting toward the back or only the passenger area creates blind spots, and shining away from the vehicle misses interior activity entirely. This approach offers the best balance of interior visibility and officer safety at night.

7. When a witness becomes a suspect, the interview is best described as what?

When a witness becomes a suspect, the questioning shifts to being interrogation. This means the interview is now purposeful and structured to obtain information that could be used as evidence, including admissions or a confession, with the focus on the suspect's involvement in the crime. A non-custodial interview emphasizes a voluntary, cooperative tone and isn't the right fit once suspicion exists. A custodial interview refers to the setting of custody rather than the shift in purpose; the key change here is the transition to interrogation to elicit information or admissions. An incriminating interview isn't a standard term for this scenario. So the best description is interrogation.

8. Which statement is INCORRECT regarding methods of avoiding cross-contamination at a crime scene?

The idea here is to prevent cross-contamination by limiting who handles evidence and how it's handled. To keep evidence pristine, gloves are changed between items, each piece is packaged separately, and only trained personnel follow a controlled, step-by-step process to collect and document items, preserving the scene's integrity and the chain of custody. Allowing the entire crime team to help collect evidence when time is tight undermines that control. More people touching items increases the chance of transferring trace evidence from one object to another, contaminating samples and making it harder to establish where each item came from. Time pressure doesn't justify loosening these safeguards; instead, teams should be organized so that a designated, trained subset handles collection, with clear roles, proper PPE, and sticking to single-item handling and proper packaging. If more hands are needed, bring in additional trained personnel and follow the same procedures to maintain evidence integrity.

9. In Michigan, adults are anyone age and over?

In Michigan, the age of adulthood is 18. That means anyone 18 years old or older is considered an adult for most legal purposes—voting, entering contracts, serving on juries, and being subject to adult criminal law. Other ages have different permissions: driving can begin at 16 with a permit and license, and the legal drinking age is 21. So 18 and over is the standard threshold for adulthood.

10. In the use of force continuum, which of the following is an example of the less-lethal use of force?

A. Use of a baton

B. Verbal commands

C. Firing a pistol

The main idea here is that the use of force continuum guides officers to escalate force in a controlled way, using options that are less likely to cause serious harm before moving to deadly force. A baton is a designed, intermediate tool used to gain control or create separation with controlled impacts, aiming to stop an aggressive action without intending to kill. It fits squarely in the less-lethal category because it provides a physical method to compel compliance that is more than verbal commands but not intended to cause lethal harm when used properly. Verbal commands are even less forceful since they don't involve physical impact, and firing a pistol is deadly force, while shoving is a basic hand-held or empty-hand technique that can cause harm but isn't the specific tool-based, controlled option highlighted here.
