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Explanations

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1. The flow of positive and negative electric currents through a conductor and back to the generating source is called a complete electric current.

Current flows only when there is a closed loop that carries charges from the source, through a conductor, and back to the source. The phrase "complete electric current" matches this idea by describing a full, closed path for the current to travel. Without that closed loop, the current would stop. The other terms don't convey this full concept: an electrical track isn't standard terminology for a circuit; a circuit path suggests a route but not necessarily the completed loop; alternating currents refer to the direction of flow changing over time, not the requirement of a closed circuit.

Leukoderma denotes loss of pigment in the skin, resulting in lighter patches that stand out against surrounding skin. The root leuko- means white, so this term specifically describes depigmented or hypopigmented areas rather than darker areas. This is different from dark or brown patches, which reflect increased pigment, and red patches, which indicate inflammation or increased blood flow. In practice, leukoderma can occur when melanocytes are damaged or absent in patches, as seen in conditions like vitiligo, leading to clearly lighter skin patches.

An antiseptic is an agent designed to kill or inhibit the growth of microorganisms on living tissue, such as skin or mucous membranes. This makes it suitable for surface decontamination without causing excessive tissue damage, which is why it's the best fit for the description. Disinfectants are intended for inanimate surfaces and would be too harsh for living tissue. Sterilizers aim to eliminate all forms of life, including spores, and are used on objects, not on people. Antibiotics work inside the body to treat infections, and while some can be topical, the term in this context specifically refers to agents used on living tissue to prevent infection at the surface, which is the role of antiseptics.

Desmosomes hold neighboring keratinocytes together, giving the epidermis its mechanical strength. This cell-to-cell binding is most evident in the stratum spinosum, where the cells are alive and tightly connected by numerous desmosomes, which also give it the characteristic prickly appearance under the microscope. The bottom layer mainly uses hemidesmosomes to attach to the basement membrane, while the upper layers undergo keratinization and eventual shedding, with desmosomes becoming less functional as cells mature and die.

5. In muscular anatomy, the origin of a muscle is the part that remains stationary during movement. Which option best completes this statement?

Origin is the attachment that stays fixed during contraction. So the bone that remains stationary best completes the statement because the muscle shortens to pull its insertion toward that fixed point, producing movement at the joint. For example, the biceps brachii attaches to the scapula at the origin and to the radius at the insertion; during elbow flexion, the insertion moves toward the origin while the scapula acts as the stable anchor. The other ideas don't define origin: the bone that moves during contraction corresponds to the insertion, the joint involved is a site of movement rather than the anchor, and the muscle itself is the tissue that contracts, not the stationary anchor point.

Light not visible to the naked eye comes from wavelengths outside the portion of the spectrum our eyes can detect. Humans perceive visible light, which includes colors like red and blue, but there are forms of light beyond that range, such as infrared and ultraviolet. The term that best describes light you cannot see without instruments is invisible light, because by definition it cannot be seen with the naked eye. The other options describe light we can perceive directly: visible light is the overall range we can see, and red and blue are colors within that visible spectrum.

7. Which salon disinfectant can destroy fungi:

Fungicidal disinfectants are labeled to kill fungi, including yeasts and molds. In a salon, fungi can cause infections if tools or surfaces are contaminated, so using a product that specifically kills fungi helps prevent those risks. The other types target different organisms: virucidal products kill viruses, bactericidal products kill bacteria, and tuberculocidal products kill mycobacteria like the TB bacterium. They aren't guaranteed to destroy fungi unless the product is also labeled fungicidal. So the best choice is the one that explicitly includes fungi in its kill spectrum. Remember to follow the label for contact time and surface compatibility.

Electric current flows most easily through materials that allow charged particles to move freely. Metals do this well because their atoms release a cloud of free electrons that can drift when voltage is applied, making them good conductors. Copper is a prime example of a metal with very high conductivity, so it's a classic conductor. Water conducts electricity because it usually contains dissolved minerals and salts that form ions; those ions move and carry charge, allowing current to pass. Pure distilled water, on the other hand, has few ions and acts more like a poor conductor. Substances that resist movement of charge, such as dry wood or plastic, are insulators. The term amperes, or amps, is a unit of current, not a material, so it doesn't describe a conductor.

The tissue beneath the dermis that stores fat is the subcutaneous tissue, also known as the hypodermis. This layer is mainly adipose (fat) tissue that serves as an energy reserve, provides insulation, and cushions the body. It also helps anchor the skin to underlying structures like muscles while allowing some movement. The epidermis is the outer protective layer, and the dermis sits above the subcutaneous tissue and contains collagen, elastin, nerves, and glands. Deep to the subcutaneous layer lie muscles.

10. Which current changes direction periodically?

- A. Sporadic current

Changing direction periodically means the electrons switch the direction they move in at regular intervals. This is the defining feature of alternating current, where the source reverses polarity and the current flows back and forth in a repeating cycle (such as 50 or 60 times per second in power systems). Direct current, in contrast, moves in one steady direction. The term sporadic current isn't a standard description of a waveform, and saying all of the above would be inaccurate because not all options involve periodic reversal. So, the current that changes direction periodically is alternating current.
