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Explanations

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1. What is food insecurity?

- A. Food safety concerns only.

Food insecurity means not having reliable access to enough, nutritious food to maintain an active, healthy life. It involves both limited access (not enough money or resources to obtain food) and uncertainty about future access (food may not be available consistently from week to week). This concept focuses on whether people can obtain adequate quantities and quality of food when they need it, rather than situations about safety, waste, or dietary preferences. It's distinct from food safety concerns, which are about preventing contamination and ensuring proper handling of food. It's also not about having too much food or waste from surplus, nor about everyone choosing high-protein diets. So the description of limited or uncertain access to adequate food best captures what food insecurity means.

Not having stable housing creates ongoing uncertainty that triggers chronic stress. This stress can spill into both mental and physical health, as sleep is disrupted, worry becomes persistent, and access to consistent healthcare and nutritious food is harder to maintain. When families face housing insecurity, children experience more moves and disruptions in schooling, which undermines learning and social development, while adults may struggle with irregular work and financial strain. Over time, these health and stress effects contribute to broader social problems such as higher healthcare costs, greater strain on social services, and cycles of poverty and homelessness. Other outcomes like suddenly better employment prospects or sturdier neighborhood stability don't align with the destabilizing reality of housing insecurity, so the stronger, more far-reaching influence is the rise in stress and health risks.

Social policy can reduce poverty by directly increasing the resources available to people with low incomes and by shaping incentives that help people move into and stay in work. An example is the Earned Income Tax Credit, a refundable credit for low- and moderate-income workers. It adds to take-home pay even if you don't owe much in taxes, so it effectively raises the income of working families. By boosting after-tax earnings, it can lift some people above the poverty line and reduce the depth of poverty, while also encouraging work because the benefit grows with earnings up to a point. This concrete instrument shows how policy can translate into real financial gains for those most in need. Other options either deny policy impact or describe more limited or inaccurate effects, whereas the EITC illustrates a clear, work-incentivizing pathway policy uses to address poverty.

Economic growth, on the other hand, depends on factors like investment, technology, and productivity—not on individuals' feelings of deprivation. Life chances can be affected by deprivation, but relative deprivation does not automatically increase them; it can even hinder opportunities if it fuels instability. Social harmony is unlikely when people feel deprived; tensions and conflict tend to rise rather than cohesion. So the situation most consistently fueled by relative deprivation is protests and social movements.

Migration policy is a government framework of rules governing movement across borders: who can enter, stay, work, or become a citizen, and how the flow of people is managed. It directly addresses issues that arise from cross-border movement, such as family separation, how newcomers are integrated into society (education, housing, rights), and the effects on the labor market (jobs and wages). This makes it the best choice because it captures both the cross-border focus and the real-world policy challenges involved. The other options don't fit: domestic travel within a country isn't about crossing borders, environmental protection of immigration centers concerns facilities rather than the policy framework, and language translation for border officials is an operational detail rather than the overarching policy about movement rules.

Social capital is the value created by a community's networks, relationships, trust, and norms that make people willing to cooperate and help one another. When these ties are strong, information and resources move through the community, and people can coordinate mutual aid in times of need. An example of this is mutual aid and information sharing through networks—neighbors lending a hand, sharing job leads, or organizing support during a crisis. This shows how connected communities mobilize resources and support. Decreased social trust would weaken social capital rather than illustrate it, and isolation of individuals breaks the networks that make such sharing possible. Increased taxes on residents isn't about the benefits of social capital itself; it's a fiscal policy outcome, not a direct result of the community's social networks and norms.

Cross-border economic activity driven by firms operating in multiple countries is best described by transnational corporations. This setup enables the global movement of capital, goods, services, and technology, tying economies together through the actions of these firms. Globalization refers to the broad process of increasing interconnectedness, not specifically to the firms themselves; a domestic economy remains within a single country, and transnational economics isn't a standard term for this concept. So, the term that most directly captures how firms operate across borders to drive cross-border activity is transnational corporations.

That's why the statement about policy feedback is accurate: policies don't just solve problems in the moment; they alter how people participate, who has power, what people expect from government, and how credible or legitimate certain policies appear in subsequent debates. For example, a retirement program creates a vested interest and expectations about government involvement, which can sustain support and steer future reform discussions. Similarly, regulatory or entitlement policies can mobilize new interest groups and shape the arguments teams use in later policy fights. The other ideas—claims of no effect, being a myth, or affecting only the economy—ignore how policies leave political traces that influence future decisions, coalitions, and public opinion.

Ethical data collection centers on respecting individuals' rights and minimizing harm. Informed consent ensures participants understand how their data will be used and agree to it. Protecting privacy means keeping personal information confidential and secure. De-identification reduces the risk of linking data back to individuals. Minimizing data collection means gathering only what is necessary to answer the research question. Publishing participants' names with their data violates privacy and confidentiality and often requires explicit consent, yet it increases potential harm and undermines trust. For these reasons, that practice does not fit ethical data collection.

Globalization describes the increasing integration of economies across borders—more trade, investment, production networks, and the rapid flow of technology and information. This growth in cross-border economic activity is often driven by multinational corporations that coordinate sourcing, manufacturing, and selling in multiple countries to access resources, cheaper labor, and larger markets, creating global production chains and international capital movement. Deindustrialization refers to a decline in a country's manufacturing sector, not the broader cross-border expansion of economic activity. Transnational corporations are the firms that operate in several countries, but the concept asked for is the broader process of cross-border economic integration. Domestic policy deals with a country's internal rules and regulations. Therefore, globalization is the best fit for the described idea.
