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1. What are three ways to signal for help?

The correct answer highlights effective and widely recognized methods for signaling for help in an emergency situation. Using a gun, whistle, or mirror to signal three times serves to catch attention and increases the chances of being spotted or heard by rescuers. The significance of signaling three times stems from the principle of creating a pattern that distinguishes an emergency signal from normal sounds or navigation practices. For instance, three gunshots or three loud blasts from a whistle convey a clear message of distress, whereas a single sound may not be noticed amidst background noise.
