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Explanations

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1. What treaty ended the French and Indian War?

The Treaty of Paris 1763 is the correct answer as it formally ended the French and Indian War, which was the North American theater of the broader Seven Years' War. This treaty marked a significant shift in the balance of power in North America. The main idea is that this war shifted North American power to Britain. Britain defeated France, and by the Treaty of Paris in 1763 France ceded Canada and most lands east of the Mississippi to Britain, while Spain ceded Florida to Britain (France kept a few Caribbean holdings and Louisiana was later handed to Spain). This gave Britain a vast continental empire and set up the fiscal and political tensions that would later contribute to colonial resistance. The other options don't fit: France did not keep Canada; independence of the colonies had not happened yet; and Florida's status wasn't lost by Spain as a result of this war.

Survival in a new land often depended on forming alliances with local Native peoples who understood the land and how to live in it. The Wampanoag, who lived near Plymouth, offered crucial help to the Pilgrims during their first winter. Leaders like Massasoit worked to create a peaceful relationship, and through Squanto, a Patuxet who had learned English, the settlers learned how to plant crops, fish, and use local resources to stay alive. This assistance allowed the Pilgrims to endure the harsh winter and begin a lasting presence in the region, leading to the harvest gathering later that year. The other tribes—the Cherokee, Sioux, and Iroquois—were located in different areas and did not provide the aid to the Pilgrims during that initial winter.
