The signal word "Danger" is specifically used to denote the highest level of hazard, particularly in the context of Hazard Class I which includes chemicals that are classified as having severe corrosive properties. Understanding this critical distinction is essential for the safe handling and application of pesticides, ensuring users are aware of the potential dangers involved.

Environmental impact assessments as a requirement fall under different regulatory processes that are not implied by the labeling statement. Lastly, special licenses for hazardous materials pertain to specific regulatory frameworks rather than general usage violations related to product labeling.

"Hazard" is more generic and not a standardized signal word used in the same impactful way as "Danger." Therefore, "Danger" effectively communicates the highest level of hazard relevant to the situation described.
