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Explanations

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1. Which statement is part of a checklist method for editing for clarity and accuracy?

A key idea when editing for clarity and accuracy is using a thorough checklist that addresses how ideas fit together, along with language and the credibility of the content. The statement that matches this approach spans coherence, grammar, punctuation, and factual accuracy, and also requires verifying evidence and ensuring consistency. Coherence helps the text flow logically and makes connections between points clear, while checking grammar and punctuation improves readability and reduces the chance of misinterpretation. Verifying factual accuracy and evidence guards against incorrect or unsupported claims, and confirming consistency prevents contradictions across the text. Other options don't fit because spelling alone misses many important issues that affect understanding; focusing on layout and color deals with presentation rather than the substance of the writing; and ignoring coherence would leave the piece disjointed, making the message harder to follow.

MeteoSwiss is the Swiss Federal Office for Meteorology and Climatology—the national weather service of Switzerland. It is the government agency responsible for monitoring the atmosphere, providing weather forecasts and warnings, and compiling climate data for the country. While MeteoSwiss is the brand people see for weather services, the entity itself is the federal office that carries out official meteorology and climatology work. It's not simply a weather satellite network, nor just a generic Swiss Weather Service—the formal designation identifies the specific federal agency that organizes and delivers Switzerland's meteorological services.

Isolating the variable to solve a linear equation. Start with $3x + 4 = 19$. Undo the addition by subtracting 4 from both sides, giving $3x = 15$. Undo the multiplication by dividing both sides by 3, yielding $x = 5$. So the solution is $x = 5$, since $3(5) + 4 = 19$. Quick check: $x = 4$ gives $3(4) + 4 = 20$, $x = 3$ gives 13, $x = 6$ gives 22, none of which equal 19.

Primary sources are original materials from the time period being studied, such as diaries, letters, and artifacts, which provide firsthand evidence. Secondary sources interpret or analyze those originals, like textbooks or scholarly articles written after the fact. So, a diary or artifact is a primary source, while a textbook is a secondary source. This distinction matters because diaries and artifacts show events as they were experienced or created, without later interpretation, whereas textbooks synthesize and explain those events based on multiple sources. The other statements misclassify these roles, and maps can also be primary sources if they were created during the period in question.

Coherence in a text comes from the way ideas are sequenced and connected. When the main idea is introduced, followed by logical reasoning, supporting details, and clear transitions that show how each point relates to the next, the argument flows smoothly and readers can follow the line of thought without getting lost. This is why emphasizing logical order and transitions is the best explanation of how sequencing impacts coherence. Repetition of key terms can help tie ideas together, but it doesn't by itself ensure smooth progression from one idea to the next. Long sentences often make meaning harder to follow rather than clearer. Visual layout affects readability, but coherence mainly comes from the internal sequencing and linking of ideas through transitions, not just how the text looks on the page.

Describing a scene in a logical sequence relies on giving readers a stable anchor—the setting—so they know where and when things are happening. From there, layer in sensory details—what it looks like, sounds, smells, textures—to paint a vivid picture and deepen immersion. The atmosphere emerges from these details and sets the mood for the scene. Finally, arrange these elements in a progression that makes sense, whether you move from foreground to background or follow a natural cause-and-effect or time sequence, so each detail leads smoothly to the next. This combination makes the scene coherent and easy to follow. Other approaches fail to create that flow: without a setting, details feel scattered and readers can't orient themselves; with random details and no clear sequence, the description becomes disjointed; and relying on a direct quotation in every sentence disrupts voice and rhythm, breaking immersion.

Buildings contribute to higher local temperatures because their materials store heat from the sun and then release it, plus the heat produced inside the buildings themselves. During the day, surfaces like concrete, asphalt, brick absorb a lot of solar energy and store it in their mass. Once the sun goes down, those surfaces radiate that stored heat back into the air, keeping nearby temperatures warmer than in open rural areas. Add on top the heat generated by inside systems—lighting, computers, HVAC equipment, and other machinery—which releases additional warmth into the surrounding space. This combination explains why urban areas remain hotter, especially at night. So the best explanation is that buildings give off heat stored during the day or heat from internal systems. The other options would either cool the area or not contribute to higher temperatures.

8. When should an apostrophe be used for possessive nouns?

Ownership is shown with an apostrophe. When a noun belongs to someone, we mark that relationship with 's. For a singular owner, add 's: the dog's bone means the bone belongs to the dog. If the owner is plural and ends in s, place the apostrophe after the s: the dogs' bone (one bone owned by several dogs) or the dogs' bones (multiple bones owned by them). For irregular plurals, use 's: children's toys, men's hats. Apostrophes aren't used to form plurals, to mark quotations, or to indicate past tense—those are handled in other ways. Contractions involve apostrophes too, but that's a different use from showing possession.

Maintaining suspense comes from pacing the story so readers continually wonder what will happen next. Start with a hook that poses a question, set a clear goal for the protagonist, and drop a hint of the trouble ahead. Then build rising action by introducing obstacles, delays, and smaller mysteries that complicate the path to the goal. Each new twist should raise the stakes or deepen the unknown, keeping the reader looping back to ask, "What happens next?" The climax is the moment of greatest tension, where the central question is faced head-on and the protagonist's plan is tested. After that peak, the resolution should answer the questions raised, delivering payoff and relief (or a thematically satisfying twist) that makes the tension feel earned. This structure works because suspense thrives on curiosity, stakes, and controlled information. Starting with the ending removes the mystery from the outset, so readers have nothing left to wonder. Jumping directly to the climax skips the buildup that makes the peak meaningful. Even using bullet-point outlines breaks the natural flow of a narrative and disrupts pacing, which undermines the suspense you're trying to create.

Latitude controls how directly sunlight reaches a place, which sets the amount of solar energy that region receives. Near the equator, the Sun stays high in the sky most days, so sunlight is intense and it's spread over a smaller area, producing warmer climates. Farther from the equator, the Sun's rays strike at a more oblique angle, spreading the same energy over a larger surface and passing through more of the atmosphere, which weakens the heating. Combined with longer or shorter days depending on the season, this reduces the average energy input and leads to cooler temperatures. The curved shape of the Earth makes this difference in solar angle across latitudes inevitable, creating the global pattern of warmer tropics and cooler poles. Other factors like elevation and ocean currents can tweak local temperatures, but latitude sets the baseline by controlling how much solar energy different regions receive.
