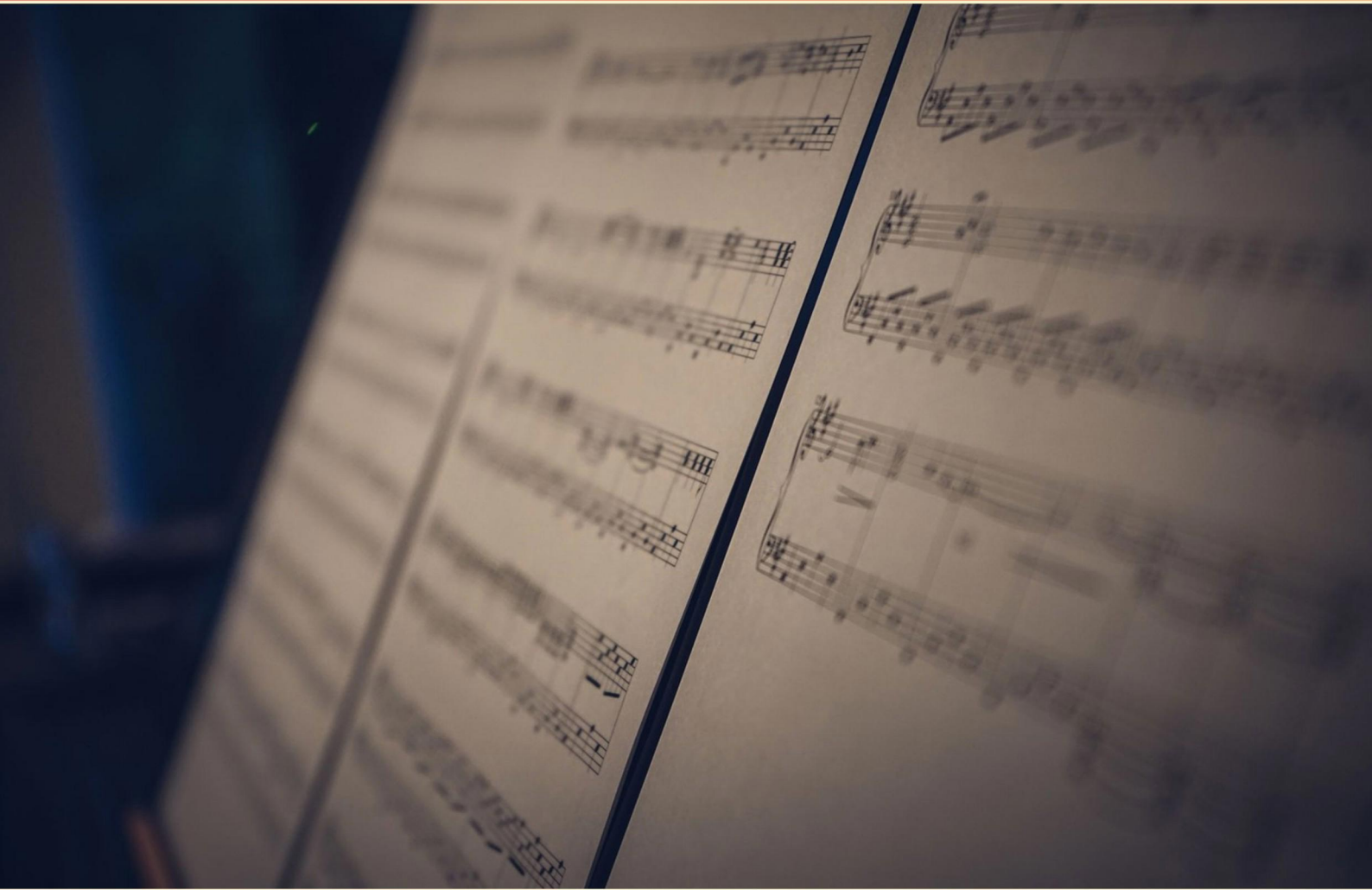

The Plagal Cadence, often referred to as the "Amen Cadence," involves a movement from the subdominant chord to the tonic, which conveys a different emotional quality. The Interrupted Cadence creates an unexpected interruption by leading from the dominant to a different chord (often the relative minor), leaving the listener in suspense rather than a feeling of completion. Therefore, the definition and function of the Perfect Cadence align perfectly with the movement from dominant to tonic, making it the correct answer.

The other choices represent different genres that do not have the same combination of cultural influences found in Celtic Rock. Jazz Folk, for example, would blend elements of jazz with folk music but does not inherently include rock components. Blues Rock and Pop Rock both pertain to specific styles within rock music with their own characteristics but do not draw from Celtic folk traditions.

In contrast, terms like diatonic refer to notes that fit within a specific scale or key, whole tone indicates intervals of a whole step (two semitones), and quarter tone refers to intervals smaller than a semitone found in some world music and avant-garde compositions. Understanding these distinctions reinforces the importance of intervallic relationships within music theory and composition.
