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Explanations

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1. What does the term nativism describe?

- A. A belief that immigration should be encouraged to fill labor needs

Nativism is an attitude that native-born Americans should be favored over immigrants and is often fueled by the belief that newcomers threaten jobs, culture, or political influence. This mindset leads to opposition to immigration and support for restrictions. The description that immigrants were bad and took jobs from Americans fits this idea, because it reflects the fear that newcomers harm native workers and national culture. The other options describe encouraging immigration, promoting immigrant rights, or tax strategies, which don't capture the anti-immigrant, protective stance that nativism represents.

2. What factor led to the growth of slavery in the American colonies?

The growth of slavery in the colonies was driven by the need for a large, reliable labor force to run plantation economies. Plantations produced labor-intensive crops like tobacco, rice, and indigo, so owners needed many workers over long periods. Paying wages or relying on indentured servants didn't provide the same steady, long-term labor, and as demand grew and costs rose, enslaved Africans became the permanent labor force that could be bought and controlled as property. The southern colonies, with their warm climates and expansive fields, depended most on this system, while the North did not rely on slavery to the same extent. The other options don't fit because there weren't policies promoting slavery from Britain, city migration didn't drive plantation labor needs, and a free wage system would reduce slavery rather than expand it.

3. Which invention led to the growth and expansion of slavery due to the expansion of cotton production?

Focusing on how technology changes both production and the people needed to do the work, the cotton gin dramatically sped up removing seeds from cotton fiber. This made cotton farming far more profitable and encouraged planters to expand cotton fields across the South. As more land was used for cotton, the demand for labor to plant, tend, and harvest the crop grew, leading to slavery becoming more deeply entrenched and expanding to support the cotton economy. The other options don't fit as directly: a sewing machine changes textile production but doesn't drive cotton expansion or labor demand; a steam engine boosts transportation and industry but isn't the trigger for growing enslaved labor tied to cotton; a telegraph improves communication but doesn't alter the scale of slavery tied to cotton production.

Pennsylvania was established to provide a safe haven where Quakers could practice their beliefs freely and where religious tolerance would be built into the colony's laws. William Penn, a Quaker, received the charter in 1681 with the goal of creating a place that would escape persecution for Quakers and allow religious liberty for others as well. This focus on freedom of worship and fair treatment of different faiths best matches the purpose behind the colony's founding. While other groups pursued colonies for different reasons—Puritans for reforms in places like Massachusetts, Catholics for Maryland, or merchants for trade opportunities—the defining motive here was religious liberty and refuge for Quakers.

The main idea is that early American policy tied land profits to supporting public education. The Northwest Ordinance of 1787 included a provision that one section of land in every township be set aside to fund public schools. Proceeds from these lands would go toward education in the Northwest Territory, creating a built-in mechanism to support schooling as new communities formed. This emphasis on education funding helped ensure that future states would have access to schooling and that education would be publicly supported rather than left to private means. It isn't about defense, environmental protection, or industrial development, which is why setting aside funds for education fits best.

Mercantilism is an economic system in which a powerful nation seeks to increase its wealth and power by controlling trade and the resources of its colonies. The mother country benefits by exporting more than it imports, accumulating wealth, and keeping colonies as sources of raw materials and markets for finished goods. The idea described here points to that dynamic: the mother country exploiting colonies, the use of trade-control policies like the Navigation Acts to regulate how trade flows, and colonial resistance such as the Boston Tea Party as a reaction to these policies. Other options don't fit as well because they describe ideas that Mercantilism isn't about: free trade among colonies goes against the controlled, protective approach of mercantilist policy; self-government and independence focuses on political status rather than economic policy; and local manufacture of all goods ignores the imperial aim of controlling trade with the mother country and managing wealth through regulation and colonial exploitation.

Mechanization in farming boosts efficiency and productivity. The steel plow made it possible to till tougher soils and work larger tracts of land, while the mechanical reaper dramatically sped up the harvesting process. Together, they let farmers plant and harvest more crops with less manual labor, increasing overall crop production and efficiency. While erosion can be a secondary issue in some farming contexts, the main outcome tied to these inventions is that crop production became more efficient, not decreased.

8. Which work is an autobiographical account describing Frederick Douglass's life as a slave?

The main idea here is recognizing a firsthand memoir that recounts the author's own experiences as an enslaved person. The best choice is a narrative that Douglass wrote himself, detailing his life in bondage, his struggle to learn to read, the brutal treatment he endured, and his eventual escape and rise as an abolitionist voice. This work is specifically designed to share one person's lived experience under slavery, making it a direct autobiographical account. Uncle Tom's Cabin is a fictional novel by Harriet Beecher Stowe that portrays slavery through characters and events, not Douglass's personal life. The Autobiography of Benjamin Franklin is about another historical figure entirely. The Crisis is an abolitionist periodical edited by Douglass that argues against slavery and promotes emancipation, but it is not his memoir recounting his enslaved years.

The study material emphasizes that the war concluded with a Union victory, and a key strategic result was the Union gaining and maintaining control of the Mississippi River. This control was crucial because it effectively divided the Confederacy, restricting its ability to move troops and supplies, and it helped the North apply pressure across multiple fronts. The capture of the Mississippi River, notably after victories like Vicksburg, is a turning point scholars highlight as part of the Union's overall win. By the end of the war, the Confederacy was defeated and its push for independence failed, while the Mississippi remained in Union hands, reflecting the war's established outcomes.

10. Which line defined the boundary where slavery could not expand into new territories under the Missouri Compromise?

- A. The 45th parallel

The line at 36°30' north latitude is the boundary being described. The Missouri Compromise drew this line to limit where slavery could expand in newly organized territories from the Louisiana Purchase. North of that latitude, slavery was prohibited in the territories, while south of it slavery could exist. To keep sectional balance in Congress, Missouri joined as a slave state and Maine as a free state. This boundary applied to future territories, not to existing states. Other lines like the equator or prime meridian aren't related to this policy.
