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## **Explanations**

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### 1. Which city is linked to the code HOU?

- A. Dallas
- B. Houston Hobby**
- C. Tucson
- D. Albuquerque

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers assigned to specific airports. The code HOU is tied to Houston's William P. Hobby Airport in Texas. Houston has another major airport, Bush Intercontinental, with the code IAH, but HOU refers specifically to Hobby. The other options map to different airports: Dallas Love Field is DAL, Tucson International is TUS, and Albuquerque Sunport is ABQ. So, the city linked to the code HOU is Houston, specifically Houston Hobby Airport.

### 2. EZE corresponds to which city?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers used to designate airports around the world. EZE is the IATA code for Ezeiza International Airport, which serves Buenos Aires, Argentina. The code comes from the airport's location (Ezeiza) near the city. Other options point to different cities: Rio de Janeiro's main airport uses GIG (Galeão) or SDU (Santos Dumont); São Paulo's main airport uses GRU (Guarulhos); Montreal uses YUL. So EZE corresponds to Buenos Aires, Argentina.

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers used in tickets, baggage handling, and flight schedules to identify airports. For Newark, New Jersey, the airport is Newark Liberty International Airport, and its IATA code is EWR. This code is the one you'll encounter on boarding passes and baggage tags for flights to or from Newark. Albany's airport uses ALB, Hartford's Bradley International uses BDL, and LaGuardia in New York uses LGA, so none of those identify Newark. EWR is the code for Newark, making it the correct choice.

#### 4. GRR is the IATA code for which city?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers used to label airports around the world, often derived from the airport or city name. GRR is the code assigned to the airport serving Grand Rapids, Michigan—Gerald R. Ford International Airport—so the city associated with GRR is Grand Rapids. These codes are what you'd see on tickets, baggage tags, and flight displays, and they're designed to be unique and memorable even when city names vary or change over time.

#### 5. Which code represents the Dallas-Fort Worth area?

Three-letter station codes are used to identify airports and, by extension, the areas they serve in North America. The Dallas-Fort Worth area is represented by the code DFW, which is the IATA designation for Dallas/Fort Worth International Airport and is commonly used to refer to the Dallas-Fort Worth metro area in travel and logistics. The other options point to other Texas cities—San Antonio, El Paso, and Houston—so they do not represent Dallas-Fort Worth.

#### 6. Which code is assigned to El Paso, Texas?

Airport codes use three-letter IATA identifiers to name airports and quickly identify locations. For El Paso, Texas, the IATA code is ELP, which stands for El Paso International Airport. The code that matches El Paso in the options is Elp. The other codes point to different cities: Tampa, Houston, and San Antonio.

## 7. YYZ corresponds to which city?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers used to designate airports worldwide. YYZ is the IATA code assigned to Toronto Pearson International Airport, which serves the city of Toronto in Ontario, Canada. Canadian airport codes often start with Y, with the remaining letters helping distinguish the specific airport. For example, Montreal is YUL, Santa Ana's airport code is SNA, and Amsterdam's is AMS. So YYZ maps to Toronto.

Airports are identified by three-letter IATA codes used on tickets and baggage tags. Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport in Texas has the code DFW, which is the label you'd see for flights to or from that area. The other codes point to different airports (Tampa, San Antonio, and Houston), so the Dallas-Fort Worth code is the one that matches this destination.

## 9. Which city and state correspond to the airport code MSP?

IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers for airports, and MSP specifically identifies Minneapolis-Saint Paul International Airport in Minnesota. The code reflects the two-city region it serves—the Minneapolis-Saint Paul area in Minnesota—so when you see MSP, you're looking at the main airport for that Twin Cities region. The airport sits between Minneapolis and Saint Paul, making it the primary international gateway for Minnesota. Other common codes point to different cities: Milwaukee's airport uses MKE, Atlanta's is ATL, and Daytona Beach's is DAB.

**10. CMH represents the IATA code for which city?**

CMH is the IATA code for Columbus, Ohio, specifically the John Glenn Columbus International Airport. IATA airport codes are three-letter identifiers assigned to airports, often reflecting the airport's name or the city it serves. In this case, CMH comes from Columbus Municipal (Port Columbus) history, linking it to Columbus. Nearby Ohio cities use different codes—Cincinnati uses CVG, Dayton uses DAY, and Grand Rapids uses GRR—so CMH clearly designates Columbus.
