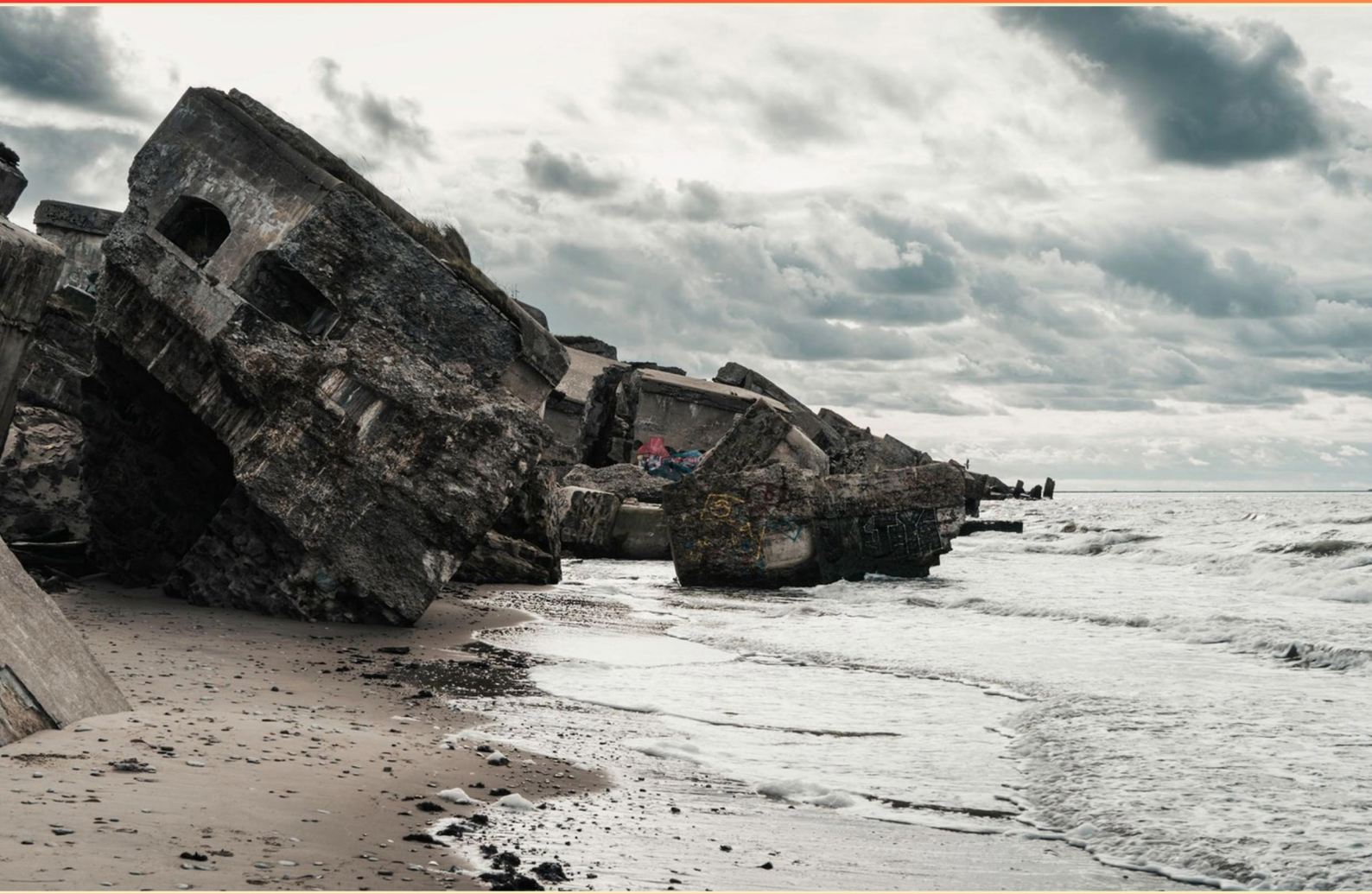

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Explanations

This detail also helps map the survivors' geography, highlighting how Severn City serves as a refuge within reach of major Canadian cities. The other cities listed aren't named as his intended destination in the text, so Toronto is the correct reference.

Memory acts as a living guide in the story, linking past and present and directing what characters do. The memory of him influences what characters value—art, storytelling, compassion—and it motivates them to preserve and share those things. For example, his life and death become material that Miranda uses to create a graphic novel, which then travels with the troupe and helps carry meaning across generations. In this way, Arthur's death becomes a memory that actively shapes characters' actions, not merely a one-time event or something forgotten. The other options don't fit because the impact isn't limited to a single event, isn't erased from memory, and isn't simply a symbol of decay; it functions as an ongoing influence on behavior through remembered significance.

The main idea here is the Traveling Symphony's artistic focus and purpose. Their performances center on high art from before the collapse, which is why Shakespeare and classical music form their core repertoire. This emphasis distinguishes them from modern genres like jazz, blues, contemporary pop, or folk tunes, which aren't what the group is defined by in the story. The choice that matches their identity—performing Shakespeare and classical music—reflects their mission to keep civilization's artistic heritage alive in a world that has lost much of its daily culture.
