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1. Which medication is primarily indicated for the treatment of anxiety disorders?

Calcium channel blockers function by relaxing vascular smooth muscle but tend to be used when diuretics alone are not sufficiently effective. ACE inhibitors offer benefits such as renal protection and are often chosen for patients with conditions like heart failure or those with diabetes, but they are not the primary choice for initial treatment compared to
