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Explanations

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1. Which option lists common uses for calico?

- A. Children's wear and curtains**
- B. Fine jewelry and leather goods
- C. Electronic components and glassware
- D. Brewing equipment and roofing

Calico is a plain-woven cotton fabric that's lightweight, breathable, and affordable. Those qualities make it ideal for everyday wear, especially for children, because it's comfortable to touch and easy to wash. It's also a common choice for home textiles like curtains, since it drapes well and is inexpensive enough for simple, practical décor. The other options point to materials and uses that don't align with fabric like calico—fine jewelry and leather goods involve metals and leather, while electronic components, glassware, brewing equipment, and roofing rely on materials other than plain cotton fabric. So pairing children's wear with curtains captures the typical, everyday uses of calico.

2. Raschel Knit Lace commonly uses which yarn type?

Raschel Knit Lace relies on filament-type yarns because the warp-knit structure needs smooth, continuous strands to form crisp, delicate openwork patterns. Filament yarns provide a uniform thickness and low pilling, which helps create the fine lace fabric without snagging. When those filaments are textured, they gain some bulk and elasticity, improving coverage and hand feel while still allowing the intricate motifs to be produced by the machine. This combination—filament and textured filament—matches how Raschel lace is typically made. While natural fibers like wool or silk can appear in specialty laces, and 100% polyester is a filament option, the broader category of filament and textured filament yarns best describes the yarn form commonly used in Raschel lace.

The way warp yarns are made—spun versus filament—determines the fabric's hand and surface. Peachskin fabric is valued for its soft, smooth, lightly brushed feel, which comes from using spun warp yarns made from short staple fibers twisted together. This creates a matte, velvety surface with a gentle loft that reads as peach-skin. Filament warp uses continuous filaments and yields a crisper, slicker surface, not the typical peachskin feel. A textured warp would add visible surface texture, altering the smooth finish peachskin is known for. And "woven warp" is too generic; it doesn't describe the yarn type that defines the fabric's characteristic hand. So spun warp best matches the peachskin look and feel.

Resist-dye patterns come from dyeing the yarns before weaving, which is the hallmark of ikat. In ikat, the warp and/or weft yarns are tied or bound so that dye cannot reach certain sections, and after weaving you get the characteristic softly feathered patterns that reveal the pre-dyeing design. The description of the fabric as 100% cotton, spun, balanced plain weave fits ikat well because this combination yields a stable, even surface that clearly displays the pre-dyed pattern without extra texture or sheen. Batiks use wax as a resist on the finished fabric, producing sharp edges but not the pre-weave yarn resist that defines ikat. Calico is simply a plain-weave cotton fabric, often with small prints, but it isn't inherently tied to a resist-dye technique. Ripstops refer to a weave structure with a grid for durability, not a resist-dye pattern. So the fabric associated with resist dye/ikat is ikat.

Fabric texture and weight determine what garments it works best in. Wool crepe has a subtle crinkle texture with a soft, fluid drape and enough body to hold a silhouette without feeling stiff. That combination makes the 62 wool crepe variant ideal for jackets and outerwear, where you want clean lines, a refined look, and good structure. The texture helps hide minor wrinkles, which is convenient for pieces that get worn and moved in. T-shirts rely on soft, knit, stretch fabrics, which wool crepe isn't suited for. Gloves require smooth, very flexible materials, not a woven crepe. Suits can use textured fabrics, but this variant's strength lies in outerwear and jackets where its drape and structure shine.

6. What weave is used in Drapery Casement?

Leno weave creates an open, stable mesh by twisting adjacent warp yarns around the weft, locking them in place so the fabric stays square and resistant to shifting. This makes a drapery casement fabric airy and breathable while still holding its shape at the edges, which is ideal for curtains that need to hang cleanly without sagging or sagging gaps. Plain weave would be too tight and not give the open, airy effect; satin weave produces a smooth surface with long floats and lacks the structure to keep an open mesh stable; twill weave creates diagonal ridges and a different drape, not the open, stable mesh needed for casement areas.

7. Which fabric drapes well and has a lustrous finish, commonly used for blouses and dresses?

Draping quality and surface shine drive how a fabric behaves in blouses and dresses. Surah offers a smooth, satin-like finish and a soft, fluid hand, so it falls in elegant, graceful folds and catches light with a refined sheen. This combination gives garments a sleek silhouette and a polished look, which is exactly what's desired for flowing tops and dresses. In contrast, herringbone is a textured weave that reads more structured and bulkier; denim is heavy and typically matte with limited drape; serge is a durable twill with more rigidity and less shine. So Surah's lightweight, lustrous drape makes it the best fit for draped, dressy pieces.

8. Bengaline is composed of what warp and filling fibers?

- A. 68% acetate warp / 32% rayon filling**

The key idea here is the specific fiber makeup of Bengaline: it uses acetate fibers in the warp and rayon fibers in the filling, with the warp being the dominant yarn. Acetate in the warp provides a strong, glossy surface, while rayon in the filling gives a softer hand and better drape, so the fabric's sheen and feel come from this particular combination. The typical ratio, about 68% acetate in the warp and 32% rayon in the filling, reflects that warp dominance and helps explain Bengaline's characteristic appearance. Other options describe structure or finishing methods rather than the actual warp and filling fibers, so they don't answer the fiber composition question.

9. Which fabric is 100% organic, naturally colored cotton and features a jacquard weave?

Jacquard weaving uses a loom that controls each warp yarn to create complex, repeating patterns. Fabrics described as Jacquard Upholstery are specifically produced with this weave and are typically intended for furniture coverings, signaling the presence of a jacquard pattern. Among the options, the name that directly indicates the jacquard technique is Jacquard Upholstery, making it the best match for a fabric that is 100% organic, naturally colored cotton and woven jacquard. The other fabrics refer to different weave styles: Bird's eye pique is a small geometric texture from a non-jacquard weave; tapestry is a heavy, pictorial weave built with discontinuous wefts; damask describes a reversible figured weave and, while often produced on jacquard looms, is not named to emphasize the jacquard method as clearly.

10. Which fabric is 100% rayon, spun, single filling knit, discharge print?

- A. Velveteen

The key idea is matching fabric structure to the specification: a knit fabric (not woven) that can be made from spun 100% rayon in a single filling knit, often used with a discharge print. Jersey is the classic single filling knit—smooth on the face and slightly textured on the back—made in a variety of fibers, including 100% rayon in spun form. This combination fits well with a discharge print, which removes dye to create lighter patterns on a dyed fabric. The other options are woven or have pile textures (velvet, velveteen) or a puckered weave (seersucker), so they don't align with the "single filling knit" description. Therefore, jersey best meets all the criteria.
