Centralizing everything in one data center would create unnecessary latency, complicate compliance with regional data rules, and increase risk if that single site experiences an issue. Disabling cross-region replication would break the ability to manage globally and synchronize state across regions. Data at rest needs strong encryption to keep stored information—such as collected inventory, results, and backups—unreadable if storage is ever compromised, typically using robust symmetric encryption and proper key management. Governing access with strong controls ensures only authorized users and services can touch Tanium data, applying the principle of least privilege and, where appropriate, multifactor authentication. Audit logging provides a reliable record of who did what and when, which is essential for incident response, forensics, and compliance. Regular key rotation minimizes the impact of any potential key exposure and supports ongoing security hygiene. This combination—TLS for transport, encryption at rest, strong access controls, comprehensive audit logs, and routine key rotation—embodies best practices for protecting Tanium data in transit and at rest. Scenarios that rely on weak encryption, storing data nowhere, or disabling access logs would leave data unprotected and monitoring blind, which is not acceptable for secure operation.

This means commands (cmdlets) produce and consume .NET objects as they pass through the pipeline, so data retains structure—properties and methods—rather than being reduced to plain text. That object flow makes data manipulation and automation more powerful and consistent. You can customize and extend what PowerShell can do by creating functions, scripts, and loading modules, which adds new cmdlets and capabilities. It isn't GUI-only and isn't limited to fixed commands; it's designed for interactive use and automation, with broad extensibility and, in modern forms, cross-platform support.

File descriptors map the standard streams to specific numbers: standard input, standard output, and standard error are 0, 1, and 2 respectively. The other streams use 1 for STDOUT and 2 for STDERR, so output redirection affects 1 and error redirection targets 2. In short, STDIN corresponds to the number 0.

It minimizes manual scripting, reduces patch gaps, and helps maintain security and compliance across both Microsoft and non-Microsoft software. Choices that say patches are limited to Microsoft, require external scripts, or aren't supported don't reflect how Tanium's patching ecosystem is designed to function.
