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Explanations

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1. What is the role of an Internet Service Provider (ISP)?

Providing access to the Internet is the main job of an Internet Service Provider. An ISP acts as the gateway between your device and the wider network, giving you a connection type (like broadband, fiber, DSL, or mobile data), assigning IP addresses, and routing your traffic so you can browse, email, stream, and reach websites. They may also offer extras such as email accounts or basic security, but their essential role is to connect you to the Internet and keep that connection running. Antivirus software, computer manufacturing, and online storage are different kinds of services: antivirus protects your device, a computer maker supplies hardware, and online storage holds files in the cloud. Those functions are separate from the ISP's core purpose of providing internet access.

A computer virus is a program that replicates itself by attaching or copying itself into other programs stored on a computer, so it can spread when those programs are run. The defining idea is this self-replication through infection of existing software, which allows the virus to propagate across files, programs, or systems as users work with their computer. Viruses often execute only when the infected host program runs, and they may cause harm by altering data, displaying unwanted messages, or consuming resources. Backing up files is a legitimate safety tool, not a virus. A routine for cleaning malware is a remediation or removal tool, not a virus. A password management tool stores and autofills passwords, which is unrelated to the self-replicating, spreading nature of a virus.

The other responses convey weaker or hedged levels of agreement. Saying the statement is "very much like me" is still positive, but the shorter, direct form communicates the clearest, most consistent alignment with finishing early. Options that indicate little or no alignment would suggest you rarely finish early, which doesn't match the idea of a strong tendency toward completing tasks before deadlines.

The other terms describe parts of the setup—like a modem that links you to your service provider's network, or Wi Fi as a wireless way to reach a local network, or a cable as a type of physical connection—but the essential concept is the act of connecting to a network that provides Internet access.

For tracking donor names, a database shines because it stores records in structured fields (like name, contact info, donation history), makes it easy to update records, and lets you search or sort through many entries quickly. For budgeting, a spreadsheet is the right choice since it handles numbers, formulas, sums, and charts, helping you compute totals and create clear, updatable budgets. Trying to mix these roles would make one task harder: writing a letter in a spreadsheet would strip away formatting options, and budgeting in a database would complicate calculations. Using a database for letters or a spreadsheet for donor records would also be less efficient. So using a word processor for the letter, a database for donor names, and a spreadsheet for budgeting aligns each tool with its strengths.

This question tests how to read a self-referential or logically self-consistent prompt. If you tried to pick just one reason, you'd run into inconsistency with the option's claim that both are true, or you'd fail to account for the other reason that would also be true. The other options don't align with the fact as neatly because they assert only a single cause or a different combination, which can't simultaneously satisfy the condition in a self-contained way. So the most coherent, self-consistent answer is the one that says both of the earlier statements apply.

This combination—breadth of word knowledge and accurate, deliberate word choice—leads to clearer, more precise communication. The other descriptions describe interests like studying with diagrams, enjoying social events, or playing word games; they may relate to language in different ways, but they don't directly indicate a habit of precise word usage or the size of one's vocabulary.

A browser is a program that accesses and displays information on the Internet and other networks. It uses network protocols like HTTP/HTTPS to fetch web pages, then renders the content (text, images, videos, and interactive elements) so you can view and interact with websites. It also handles navigation features like hyperlinks, tabs, bookmarks, and history, making it easy to move around the web and use web apps. This is software, not hardware or storage. The other options describe a storage device, a document editor, and a physical computer component, which are not what a browser is.

Understanding acronyms means mapping the letters to the actual name of the institution. In this context, TCC refers to Tarrant County College, the community college serving the Fort Worth area. The name fits the common pattern of using the county or locality in the college's title, which helps distinguish it from other similarly named schools. The other options are not official or recognizable names for a Texas college, so the expansion that matches the real institution is Tarrant County College.

10. What is the typical grade you have achieved on prior school work?

- A. Mostly B's
- B. C's and D's
- C. D's and F's
- D. All A's**

This question asks you to reflect on your usual performance in past coursework. All A's signals the highest and most consistent level of achievement. In online courses, that level of consistency corresponds to strong understanding of material and reliable work habits—staying on top of assignments, studying effectively, and meeting deadlines without in-person reminders. That combination is what makes this choice the strongest indicator of being well prepared for online learning. The other options describe lower levels of past performance, which would imply more potential for needing support or extra time, whereas All A's represents a consistently high track record.
