This ensures that the board upholds professional standards and protects the public by addressing any misconduct effectively. In contrast, other options suggest a lack of action or an overly restrictive approach to who can file a complaint. TDLR is committed to regulating the practice of esthetics to ensure public safety and professional accountability, making the process outlined in this option essential for maintaining industry standards.
