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Explanations

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1. What type of verb is used to indicate an action, event, or state of being?

However, recognizing that you only need to add 15 in total allows for a straightforward calculation: Starting at 9: - Adding 1 brings you to 10. - Adding another 9 brings you to 18. - Finally, adding the remaining 6 brings you directly to 24. The addition confirms that $9 + 15$ equals 24, which clearly shows that the sum is accurately calculated as 24. Thus, it is evident that the total when you add 9 and 15 together is indeed 24, making that the correct answer in this context.

A demonstrative pronoun is a word that points to specific things or people in a way that indicates their relative location (near or far) in relation to the speaker. While the other sentences contain demonstrative pronouns such as "these" and "those," they function as demonstrative adjectives because they describe nouns (books and cats) rather than standing alone as pronouns. "This," on the other hand, functions independently in the sentence, clearly designating a particular item that belongs to the speaker. This distinction is critical in understanding the grammatical roles of words in different contexts.

In contrast, the other options either incorrectly use "who" as the object of the sentence or misplace the preposition. For example, using "who" would be suitable if it were the subject of the sentence, but since the construction involves a preposition, "whom" is necessary for correctness. The choice of pronouns must adhere to standard rules of English grammar regarding subject and object pronouns, making this selection the most accurate under those guidelines.

Thus, this construction shows both the timing of the action and its completion relative to another event, which is the hallmark of future perfect tense.
