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Explanations

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1. Why are waterfowl difficult quarry?

- A. They are dangerous to handle
- B. They swim poorly

Waterfowl are difficult quarry because they are strong fliers. Their powerful wings let them take off quickly from water, reach high speeds, and perform rapid, unpredictable maneuvers to evade a pursuing bird. They can sustain long flights and exploit wind currents to outrun and outmaneuver a falcon, which makes interception and successful stooping very challenging. This combination of speed, endurance, and evasive flight is what makes waterfowl notably tough to hunt with a raptor. They're not particularly dangerous to handle, they swim well, and they're typically diurnal rather than nocturnal, which doesn't explain the difficulty in pursuit.

Imprinting is a rapid, irreversible learning process in a young bird during a sensitive period, where it forms a strong social attachment and identifies the first moving object it encounters as a parent or mate. When that first caregiver is a human, the bird can imprint on humans, leading to a bond with people rather than its own species and often to following humans. This is why identifying with humans is the best description. It's not simply tame from petting, nor is it about mimicking sounds or recognizing food by scent.

This keeps the bird out of harm and ensures it's in capable hands or returned to the wild when appropriate. Continuing to hunt, even with extra caution, risks injury to the bird and others, while hiding the hawk in a tree doesn't address the unsafe situation or protect the bird.

Feaking is the act of cleaning the beak after a meal. After eating, a raptor often has food residue on its bill, and feaking is how the bird clears those leftovers—typically by rubbing or wiping the beak on a perch or other surface. This routine helps keep the beak clean and comfortable and is a normal part of hawk care. It's not something done during a meal, nor is it about cleaning after drinking, and it's not the same as trimming the beak, which is a separate maintenance task.

Introducing quarry species is about acclimating a raptor to a new prey item. The term for this step is entering. Bating refers to luring the bird with bait to practice hunting, Manning is about getting a wild bird comfortable with human handlers, and maiden voyage is not related to falconry training. From that stationary lookout, they watch for small mammals, birds, or reptiles and, when prey is spotted, strike quickly with a precise, powerful dive. This sit-and-wait strategy is their most typical and effective hunting approach, letting them conserve energy while using surprise to their advantage. They can also hunt by soaring or diving from above in some situations, but perch and wait best captures their usual method.

9. When is a hawk ready for free flight?

The key idea is that readiness for free flight is about how dependable the hawk is in responding to your recall and control cues. A bird must consistently come back and respond reliably to the handler's signals, under conditions that mimic real hunting with distractions, not just after a certain number of weeks or because it looks physically mature. Reliability means you can predict its behavior and safely manage it during free flight. So, spending weeks in practice doesn't by itself guarantee readiness, and simply showing speed isn't the measure you want. Physical maturity matters for development, but it doesn't ensure the bird will reliably respond. When the hawk's responses are consistently dependable, it's ready for free flight.

10. What should a falconer do if a hawk is mobbed by ravens?

When a falcon is mobbed by ravens, the priority is to quickly reestablish control to protect the hawk and the hunt. Calling the hawk down calmly is the best move because it reestablishes contact with the bird, pulls it away from the distraction of the ravens, and allows you to recover control or move the bird to safety. This reduces the risk of injury, loss of the quarry, or the hawk becoming overly stressed. Attacking the ravens isn't appropriate and can escalate danger or cause damage. Releasing the hawk would leave it to fend for itself in the mob, increasing the chance of injury or loss. Flying in a different direction might avoid the immediate harassment, but it doesn't address the risk to the hawk or the need to regain control, and could lead to further problems.
