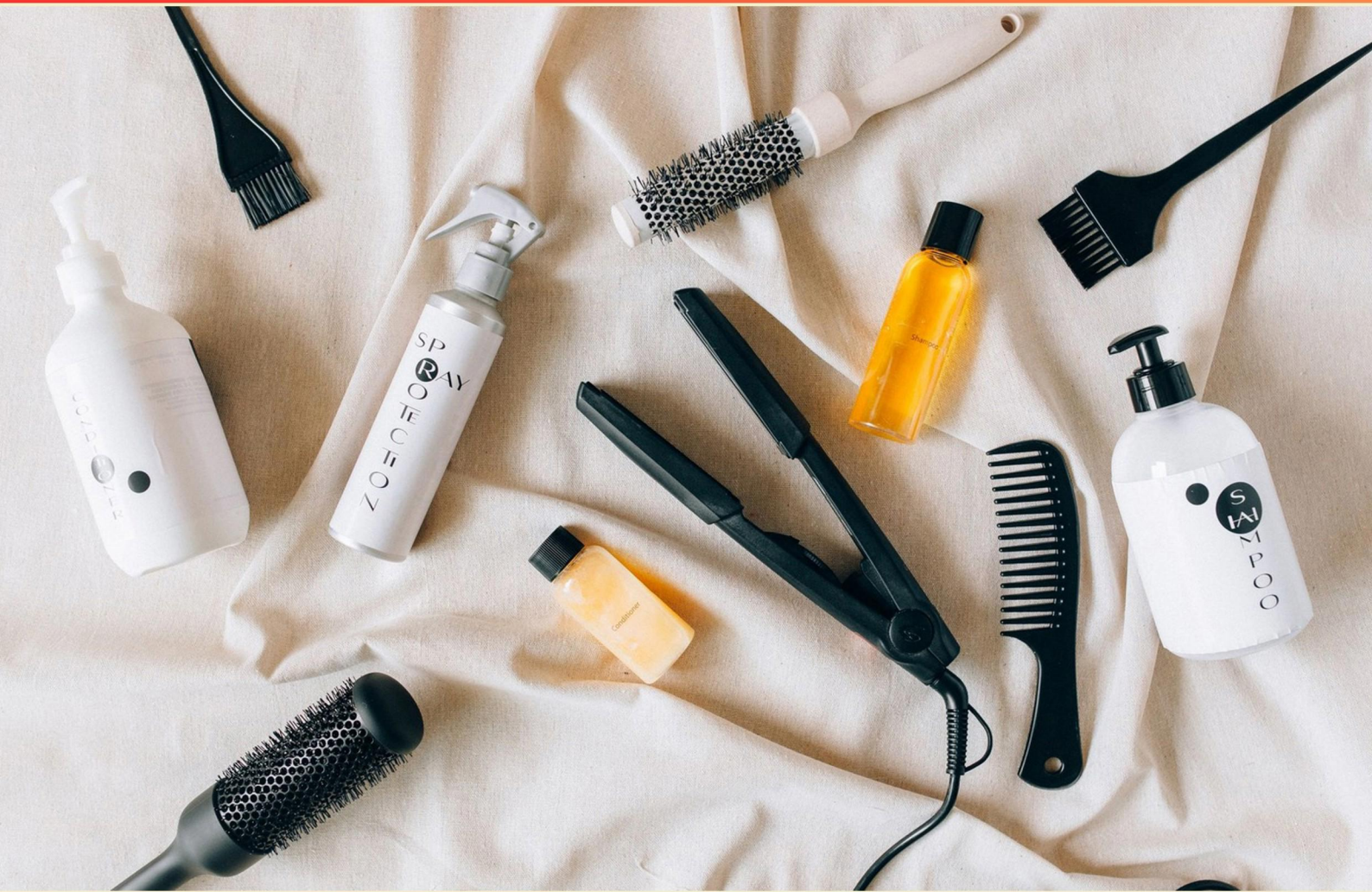

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Explanations

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1. What stroke is used on the left side of the neck and behind the left ear?

- A. Reverse backhand stroke**
- B. Freehand stroke
- C. Backhand stroke

The left side of the neck and behind the left ear is a curved, hard-to-reach area that requires the blade to move in a direction opposite to the usual backhand motion. Using a reverse backhand stroke lets you angle the edge correctly as you glide along the skin, preserving close contact with the neck skin while following the head's contour and the hair growth pattern. This orientation gives you better control in this tight spot and helps prevent nicks or irritation, which is why it's the best choice for that area. Other strokes don't align as well with the curve and reach needed behind the ear, making them less effective in this particular zone.

2. Which bonds are broken and reformed during a permanent wave?

Disulfide bonds are the key cross-links that set hair's curl. In a permanent wave, a reducing agent breaks these sulfur-sulfur bonds in the keratin of the hair, allowing the strands to be reshaped around rods. Then a neutralizer oxidizes and reforms new disulfide bonds in the hair's new configuration, fixing the curl. Hydrogen bonds can be temporarily disrupted by water and heat but they're not what creates a permanent change, so they don't provide lasting structure. Ionic bonds and peptide bonds aren't the targets of perm chemistry; breaking peptide bonds would damage the hair, and ionic bonds aren't the bonds altered to hold the new shape.

Backcombing and backbrushing are two different ways to shape volume and texture in hair, using opposite effects. Backcombing uses a comb to push hair toward the scalp, creating a teased, matted section that adds height and fullness at the roots. It's the technique you reach for when you want noticeable lift, often for bouffant or updo styles. Backbrushing uses a brush to smooth and blend the hair, guiding the teased areas into a controlled, softer silhouette without building that same level of root lift. This smoother finish helps eliminate obvious teasing lines and achieves a neater look.

Cleansing creams or lotions are designed to dissolve and lift away dirt, oil, makeup, and debris while also delivering emollients that soften the skin. That combination makes them the best choice for both softening the surface and removing impurities in one step. Toners or astringents, while useful for removing any remaining traces after cleansing and helping refine the skin, are not primarily cleansing products and can be drying. Moisturizers hydrate and protect the skin but don't remove impurities. Exfoliating scrubs physically remove dead skin and can reduce buildup, but their main role is exfoliation rather than the general cleansing-and-softening function described.

Confidentiality means protecting what clients share with you. Keeping their information private is both an ethical obligation and often a legal requirement in professional services. When you maintain confidentiality, you limit access to records to only those who need them to provide care, obtain consent before sharing, and secure the data so it isn't exposed. This respect for privacy builds trust, helps clients speak openly about their needs, and protects them from harm like embarrassment or identity misuse. Sharing information with third parties or using it for marketing violates that trust and can breach laws; trying to save time by loosening records risks bigger problems, and letting all staff access everyone's personal data destroys security and privacy.

Cap hygiene and sanitation are about preventing cross-contamination between clients. Capes touch the skin and hair and can carry oils, skin cells, microbes, and coloring agents. Laundering a cape after every client removes these residues, reducing the risk of transferring contaminants to the next person. If a cape is visibly soiled, it should be laundered immediately or replaced, since visible dirt or stains indicate contamination that laundering alone may not fully address. Weekly laundering or waiting until the cape is torn does not meet proper infection-control standards and leaves a window for cross-contact. If using disposable capes, discard after each client. Always follow the care label and use appropriate washing temperatures and detergents.

The main massage movements used in facials are effleurage, petrissage, tapotement, and friction. Effleurage involves long, smooth strokes that begin and end the treatment, helping to relax the client and distribute products while promoting lymphatic flow. Petrissage consists of kneading and lifting the tissue to improve circulation and soften underlying muscles. Tapotement includes rhythmic percussive actions like tapping or cupping to stimulate nerves and boost blood flow. Friction uses deep, small circular or transverse motions to warm the deeper layers, break down adhesions, and enhance absorption of skincare products. Other listed movements may be used in different massage contexts, but they don't represent the standard core set used for facial massage.

Before cutting, a thorough consultation and scalp analysis is essential. That information guides the cut plan, helping you choose the right technique, tools, and approach to achieve the desired look while protecting hair health. Product recommendations and pricing can come later if needed, color analysis is relevant only when coloring is involved, and a skin allergy test is important for chemical services, not for a basic cut. Taking time for this discussion reduces miscommunication and leads to a result that matches the client's expectations.

Hair texture is about how thick each strand is—its diameter. When strands are finer, the hair feels soft and lightweight; when strands are coarser, they feel thicker and can feel tougher or stiffer. This diameter-sized difference is what gives hair its texture and influences how it behaves during styling, cutting, and chemical services. Color doesn't change strand thickness, so it doesn't determine texture. Growth rate affects how quickly hair lengthens, not how thick each strand is. Scalp density grabs attention for fullness and how many hairs occupy a space, but it doesn't define the texture of individual strands. So, the diameter of individual hair strands best explains hair texture.

Local hours and policies like tipping or privacy are important, but they don't fulfill the required public posting of the mandated sanitation and safety standards.
