While other options may also provide useful information, they serve different purposes. PACER is a service that provides electronic access to federal court documents and case information, relevant mainly for legal professionals tracking court cases rather than inmate status. NCIC, or the National Crime Information Center, is a database used by law enforcement agencies for a wide range of criminal justice information, but it does not function as a direct tool for the public to check inmate status. Thus, for the specific need of checking if someone is in jail or prison, WWW.BOP.GOV is the most appropriate resource.
