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Explanations

Knowing in advance where the subject is going is essential for effective surveillance. Being prepared and informed about the subject's movements enhances the chances of success in obtaining necessary information without alerting the subject.

PACER provides access to federal court records, NCIC offers a database of criminal justice information, and TLO is a robust investigative tool that provides comprehensive background checks and information retrieval.
