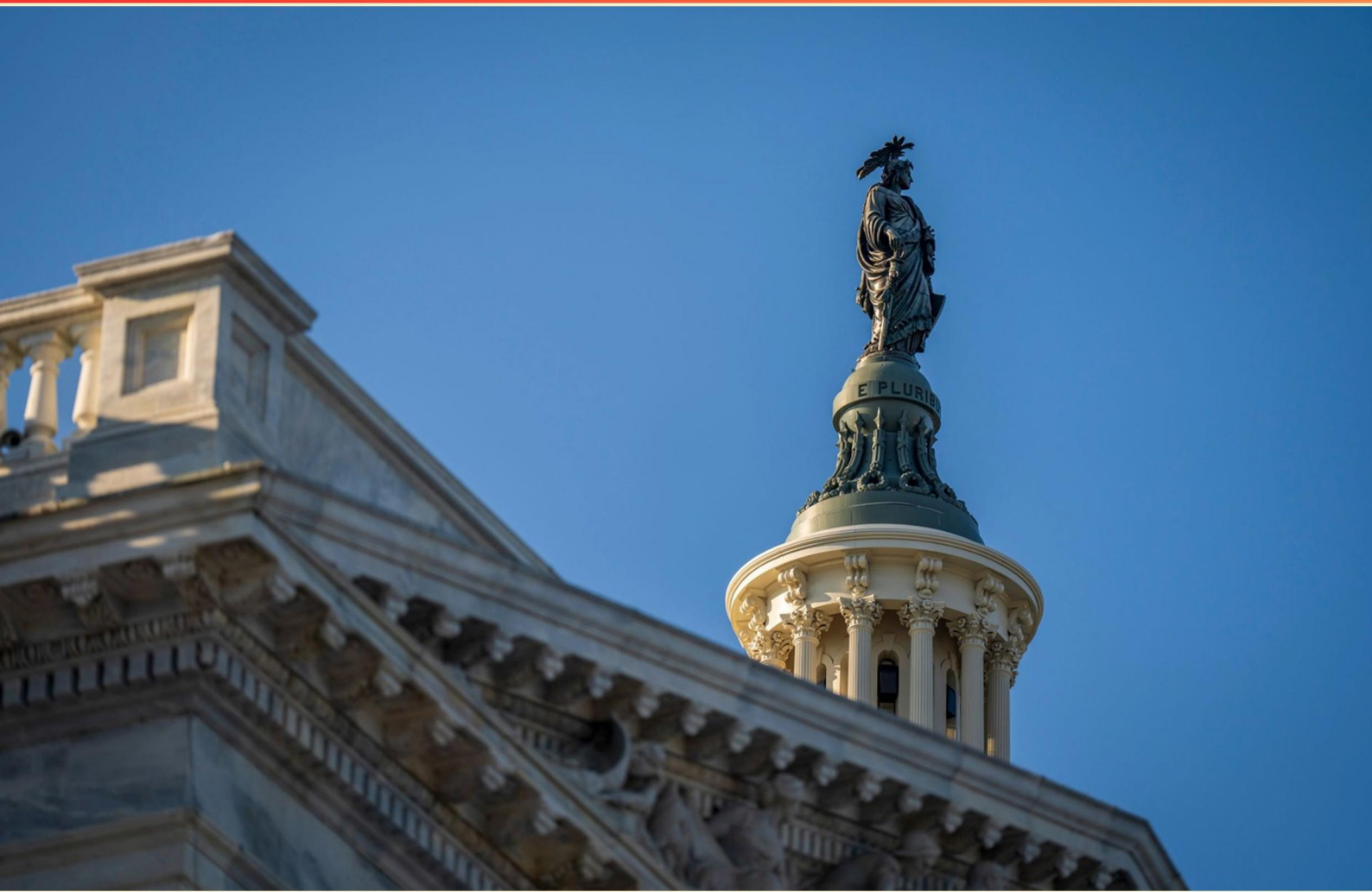

Washington D.C. is allocated three electoral votes in presidential elections. The total number of electoral votes for D.C. is equivalent to the number of electoral votes possessed by the least populous state, which also stands at three. Therefore, during presidential elections, Washington D.C. contributes three electoral votes to the total count, allowing its residents to have a say in the selection of the President and Vice President of the United States.
