Point cutting involves cutting the ends of the hair at an angle to create soften ends and texture, but it does not address bulk in the same way. Layering creates different lengths in the hair, which can also change the shape and movement, but it does not explicitly target the reduction of bulk like texturizing.

Hence, regular disinfection stands out as the essential practice for ensuring a hygienic environment in barbering.

Facial scrubs are designed to exfoliate the skin, which is not suitable immediately after shaving as the skin can be sensitive and may react negatively to exfoliation.
