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Explanations

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1. pc stands for which timing in medication orders?

- A. After Meals**
- B. Before Meals
- C. Post Caffeine
- D. Preconception

Timing in medication orders tells you when to give a med relative to meals. PC means post cibum, which is Latin for after meals. Administering a medication after meals helps reduce stomach irritation and can improve absorption for drugs that work better with food. Other common timing notes include before meals (ante cibum) or with meals, while terms like post caffeine or preconception aren't used for med timing. Some facilities also avoid Latin abbreviations and write out "after meals" to prevent misreading.

2. Which route is commonly used for tuberculosis skin testing?

Tuberculosis skin testing relies on injecting the antigen into the skin, not into muscle or other tissues, so the immune system in the skin can produce a localized delayed-type hypersensitivity reaction. An intradermal injection of purified protein derivative is placed in the dermis to create a small, visible wheal. After about 48 to 72 hours, the clinician checks for induration—a firm, raised area—rather than just redness. This intradermal placement is essential because it exposes immune cells in the skin to the antigen, allowing sensitized T cells to respond and produce a measurable reaction. Delivering the substance by an oral, rectal, or intramuscular route would not generate the same skin-specific response, so those routes are not used for TB skin testing.

3. What does VS stand for in medical shorthand?

In medical shorthand, VS most commonly stands for vital signs. Vital signs are the basic measurements that show how the body is functioning at a given moment, typically including temperature, pulse, respirations, and blood pressure, and sometimes oxygen saturation. When you see VS documented, it indicates those measurements were taken and should be monitored for any changes. The other options describe real concepts, but they aren't the standard meaning of VS in routine charting. Vascular system refers to the blood vessels and isn't usually abbreviated as VS in patient records; volume or fluid status is about hydration and balance and is usually written out or abbreviated differently; visceral structures relate to internal organs and aren't what VS denotes here. Example: VS — Temp 98.6, P 72, R 16, BP 120/80, SpO2 98% on room air.

One fluid ounce is about 29.57 milliliters, and in medical practice this is usually rounded to 30 mL for easy dosing calculations. So 30 mL is the closest and most practical equivalent to one fluid ounce. The other options are notably off: 15 mL is about half, 20 mL is not close to the true value, and 60 mL would be double.

5. Which option describes a route that bypasses the digestive system and uses injections?

Parenteral routes describe medications given by injection, bypassing the digestive system. They deliver medicine directly into the bloodstream or body tissues, rather than through swallowing. This includes intramuscular, subcutaneous, and intravenous administration. Because the GI tract is not involved, these routes avoid the effects of stomach acid and digestive enzymes on the medicine. The oral route requires swallowing and goes through the digestive tract, while the rectal route still involves the GI tract. An injection method like intramuscular fits under the parenteral umbrella, but naming the category parenteral routes best communicates the idea of injections that bypass the GI system.

6. Which dosage form releases its drug when dissolved in the mouth and has a texture similar to hard candy?

Lozenge is a solid dosage form designed to dissolve in the mouth, releasing the drug as it dissolves. Its hard candy-like texture makes it pleasant to hold in the mouth while the active ingredient passes over the oral mucosa or throat, providing local relief or allowing some systemic absorption. This distinguishes it from semisolid medications like creams or gels, which are not meant to dissolve in the mouth, and from topical products that are applied to the skin or mucous membranes. Troches are a similar mouth-dissolving form, but lozenges are the term most associated with a hard candy texture described in this question.

7. How many people must be present for a medication count?

Two people must be present for a medication count. This double-check helps ensure accuracy and prevents errors or theft, especially when counting controlled substances. The person counting compares the actual meds to the MAR, while the second person verifies the count and documents any differences, with both signing the count. If there's a discrepancy, stop, recount, secure the meds, and follow facility policy to report and document it. Relying on a single person can miss mistakes, so the dual presence provides accountability and a clear audit trail.

8. Drops refer to which of the following?

Drops are a very small amount of liquid medication delivered by a dropper. This method provides precise, localized dosing for areas like the eyes, ears, or nose, using individual drops rather than a spray or mist. The description that matches this exact idea is the tiny amount of liquid given by dropper. The other descriptions refer to sprays, mists, or flavored liquids and don't reflect the dropper-based delivery of drops.

9. Which route delivers injections into the muscle, such as in the upper arm or thigh?

Intramuscular administration delivers meds into muscle tissue. This route targets the muscle itself, with good blood flow allowing quicker absorption into the bloodstream. Common sites include the deltoid in the upper arm and the vastus lateralis in the thigh, which are convenient and can accommodate the typical volumes used for many vaccines and other injections. Intradermal injections go into the skin's dermal layer and are used for tests like TB screening, involving very small volumes. Subcutaneous injections go into the fatty tissue just under the skin, with slower absorption, and are used for medications like insulin or anticoagulants. Rectal administration is not an injection into muscle; it refers to delivering medicines via the rectum (for suppositories or enemas).

10. Elixir is defined as which of the following?

Elixir is a clear, flavored liquid that contains alcohol and is intended for oral use. It's a sweetened hydroalcoholic solution, with flavoring to improve taste. This distinguishes it from other liquid forms: a very small amount given by dropper describes drops or tinctures, not an elixir; a fine spray or mist made by a nebulizer is for inhalation; and a liquid sprayed into the nose is a nasal spray. The defining feature of an elixir is the clear, flavored, alcohol-containing liquid prepared for oral administration.
