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Explanations

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1. Which statement about subpoenas is correct?

- A. Issuing subpoenas when requested by the state or defense**

Subpoenas are formal court commands used to compel a witness to testify or to produce documents. They are issued when there is a real need for testimony or records, and the request comes from the side that needs the information—the state or the defense. The court or clerk issues the subpoena after that request, and it must be properly served so the person knows to comply. Subpoenas aren't issued on impulse and aren't optional; there are rules about who can request them, how they're served, and what the witness must do. They aren't never required—there are many situations where a subpoena is essential to secure necessary evidence. And while judges can issue subpoenas in some contexts, the usual process involves the state or defense requesting them through the court, not only judges acting on their own.

The main idea here is that the judiciary must operate independently from the other branches to decide cases without political pressure. This independence is essential because it allows judges to interpret and apply laws fairly, protect constitutional rights, and ensure due process regardless of who holds power in the legislative or executive branches. In municipal courts, this means judges can rule on local ordinances, traffic matters, and civil disputes based on the law and facts, not on outside influence from city officials or political considerations. There are structures that provide accountability and funding oversight, but they don't undermine the basic independence required for fair judging. The principle isn't something that only applies in certain states or only to criminal cases; it's a foundational element of the judiciary across jurisdictions and case types. So the statement that the judicial system is built on independence from the other branches is correct.

In public service settings, neutrality and professionalism are essential when performing official duties. Wearing political T-shirts or buttons for local races while at work can be seen as endorsing a candidate or issue, which may undermine the public's trust in the fairness and impartiality of the office. It can also create discomfort or pressure for coworkers or members of the public who visit the court. To protect the integrity of the process, most workplaces prohibit political messaging on clothing during work hours. You can express political views outside of work or in private settings, but not while serving in an official capacity. So, wearing political attire at work in this context is improper.

Fines are determined by the court, not by the clerk. The clerk's role is administrative—handling filings, scheduling, and collecting the amount ordered by the judge—but the actual penalty amount is set by the judge (and applicable law). So the proper statement is that clerks may not set fines. The other options imply the clerk has the authority to determine penalties, which isn't the case; any adjustment or permission would come from the judge, not the clerk.

5. The judge plays an adversarial role in court.

The judge's role in a court proceeding is to be neutral and act as a referee. In an adversarial system, two sides argue their case—the judge does not advocate for either side, but instead applies the law, rules on objections and evidence, manages the courtroom, and provides instructions to juries or decisions on the case. Acting adversarially would undermine fairness and the obligation to remain impartial. Therefore, the statement is not correct in a typical municipal court setting. Not specified or both don't apply here because the judge's role is defined as neutral, not contested or dual.

6. Which statement best describes the general public contact with municipal courts?

A. More citizens come into contact with municipal courts than all other Texas courts combined

Public interaction with courts is driven by everyday, routine matters. Municipal courts handle the bulk of traffic offenses and Class C misdemeanors, which are the kinds of cases most people might receive a ticket for or appear about. Because these cases are so common, municipal courts see more people than any other Texas courts combined. The other statements don't fit: violent felonies are handled in district or county courts, not municipal courts; traffic offenses are indeed within municipal jurisdiction, so saying they have no involvement with traffic is incorrect; and municipal courts are not the oldest courts. So, the description that more citizens come into contact with municipal courts than all other Texas courts combined best captures how the public generally interacts with them.

7. It is not ex parte communication to inform the judge about information from a defendant relating to the defendant's case pending in the court.

Ex parte communication means a one-sided talk with the judge outside the other party's presence, which can undermine the other side's opportunity to respond. Whether informing the judge about information from a defendant is ex parte depends on the context. If the information is shared in open court with both parties present or through counsel with notice to the other side, it's not ex parte. But if the defendant provides information to the judge privately, without the other party's knowledge or participation, that would be ex parte and improper unless a specific exception applies. In practice, always aim to present information through proper channels or in court where both sides can respond.

8. If a city does not have an ordinance governing the destruction of records and a clerk wants to destroy records, what must the clerk do?

In Texas, destroying public records isn't left to a clerk's discretion. Records must be kept according to approved retention schedules, and if there's no local ordinance governing destruction, the proper step is to obtain approval from the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. This state agency reviews and authorizes the disposal of records to ensure they're destroyed only after the legally required retention periods have passed. Destroying records immediately bypasses that safeguard, and asking the mayor or simply notifying the court isn't enough because the authority to approve destruction lies with the state library and archives commission.

9. An elected or appointed official may perform official duties before filing the anti-bribery statement with the official records of the office.

Public officials must complete the anti-bribery statement and have it on file in the office's official records before they begin performing any official duties. This requirement acts as a safeguard to prevent conflicts of interest and to promote transparency about potential influence or bribery concerns. Because of that, the idea that an official may start doing official work before the filing is not allowed, so the statement is false. The other options don't fit because the rule isn't about probation periods or only working during business hours; it's about the timing of the filing relative to taking on official responsibilities.

10. Into which two categories may municipal courts fall that dictate how proceedings are conducted?

Municipal courts fall into two categories that dictate how proceedings are conducted: Court of Record and Court of Non-Record. In a Court of Record, the court keeps a complete, formal transcript of testimony, evidence, and rulings, so everything said and shown in court is documented for an official record and for potential appeal. In a Court of Non-Record, there is no full transcript; the record is based on docket entries and minutes, and the proceedings are more informal. Federal courts are a separate system and aren't the basis for how municipal court proceedings are run. So the two categories that determine the conduct of proceedings are Court of Record and Court of Non-Record.
