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## **Explanations**

Similarly, committing a crime without intent or knowledge describes concepts related to strict liability or unintentional offenses, rather than the specific standard of negligence under Texas law. Therefore, recognizing the substantial risk threshold is critical in identifying and understanding what constitutes criminal negligence in the context of Texas penal law.*

The classification helps in the legal system's approach to justice and the handling of offenders, ensuring that more serious crimes are met with harsher consequences. Thus, the correct answer emphasizes the critical role of imprisonment in defining felonies and illustrates the importance of the classification system in the Texas Penal Code.*
