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Explanations

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1. What is the process of bacteria dividing into two new cells called?

The process of bacteria dividing into two new cells is called binary fission. Thus, the emphasis on systemic diseases being characterized by a widespread impact rather than localized symptoms supports the reasoning for identifying localized pain as the aspect that is not characteristic of these diseases.

Sanitizers work to reduce the number of germs to a safe level as deemed by public health standards, but they are not as potent against viruses as virucidal substances are. Thus, virucidal is the most precise term for substances that kill viruses.
