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Explanations

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1. Which type of bond holds sodium and chlorine together in sodium chloride (table salt)?

Sodium chloride, commonly known as table salt, is formed through an ionic bond. This type of bond occurs when one atom donates an electron to another atom, leading to a transfer of charge. This loss of an electron transforms sodium into a positively charged ion, known as a cation. The second person narrative addresses the reader directly using 'you,' creating a different kind of engagement, and the term first person omniscient implies a mix, offering a broader range of insights and perspectives that may detract from the singular, personal focus found in a true first person narrative.
