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Explanations

Copyright is legal protection that gives creators exclusive rights to reproduce, distribute, display, perform, and create derivative works from their original creations. This covers books, songs, artwork, software, films, and other original works. The purpose is to reward creativity by allowing the creator to control how their work is used and to earn income from it, typically through licensing or sale. In many places, copyright arises automatically when the work is fixed in a tangible form, though registration can aid enforcement. It lasts for the author's life plus additional years, after which the work often enters the public domain. A patent protects new inventions or processes, a trademark guards brand identifiers like names and logos, and a license is permission to use someone else's protected work rather than a form of protection itself.

For example, searching for cats AND dogs will return pages that mention both terms, while cats OR dogs will return pages that mention either one, and education NOT college will omit pages that mention college. You can also group terms with parentheses to set the order of operations, like (education OR learning) AND technology, to refine the focus further. This approach is distinct from other search methods: a keyword search looks for the words themselves without defined relationships; a natural language search interprets a user's full sentence or question; a proximity search looks for terms that appear close to each other, often with a specific distance. Boolean search is the best fit for precisely combining terms with those logical operators.

The system uses an alphanumeric approach: call numbers begin with letters to indicate broad subject areas, and those letters are followed by numbers to narrow the topic. It's not based on words alone, dates, or colors. The letters give the big category, and the numbers (often with decimals) specify subtopics in a hierarchical way.

Curriculum integration describes the end goal—information skills embedded in the curriculum—rather than the collaborative planning process.
