His presence in the house highlights the way people are categorized and dehumanized by those in power, even in private spaces where appearances of propriety are maintained. This dynamic mirrors the broader moral climate of the time, where prejudice and rigid social boundaries were part of daily life and influenced how people interacted with those perceived as different.

Power and obedience are kept in constant view through the Fury's warnings. The novel invites readers to question what they see and to understand the limits of perception. The other ideas miss this nuance: truth isn't easy to discern, it isn't irrelevant, and perception doesn't reveal everything. The book demonstrates that understanding requires stepping beyond surface impressions and considering the historical reality and human consequences.

They don't primarily serve as opposition or guardians or random kindness; instead, they illustrate the banal, pervasive nature of control in a totalitarian world.

His role and emotional journey push him to confront the consequences of Bruno's actions and his own association with the camp's world, leading him to realize the heartbreaking fate Bruno likely met. The mother, while deeply motivated and observant, clings to hope and doesn't arrive at the same definitive understanding of Bruno's end. Shmuel lacks the broader context of the adults' world and thus cannot piece together the events from Bruno's perspective. The guard operates within the routines of the camp and isn't in a position to assemble the personal timeline or infer the deeper outcome for Bruno. So, the father is the one who pieces together what happened to Bruno.
