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Explanations

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1. The Haitian Revolution led to intensified debates about liberty and equality and increased fears of slave uprisings in the French empire. Which revolution had this influence?

- A. The American Revolution.

The Haitian Revolution directly challenged who could claim liberty and equality, showing that enslaved people could organize, resist, and win independence. Its success in Saint-Domingue forced powerful debates in revolutionary France about universal rights and citizenship beyond white, property-owning men, while simultaneously heightening fears among slaveholding elites in the French empire that similar uprisings could erupt elsewhere. The other revolutions revolve around different contexts: the American Revolution influenced ideas of rights and self-government but not as directly about slave uprisings within the French empire; the Industrial Revolution centers on economic and technological change; the Glorious Revolution concerns political power in Britain. So the Haitian Revolution is the one that had this specific influence.

Moderates are the ones who seek gradual reform and a balance between order and change. They're flexible about the form of government, willing to accept the king in a limited or even no role if needed, and they want some additional reforms but not a complete overturn of the system. They also oppose using violence as a primary tool and endorse it only when it's clearly justified to defend the state or prevent greater harm. This combination—flexibility about monarchy, a desire for measured changes, and restraint in using violence—fits the description best. Royalists cling to the old order, Radicals push for sweeping reforms and accept broad use of force, and Conservatives favor preserving the existing structure with limited changes, making Moderates the best match.

3. Which queen was found guilty of treason and guillotined?

The question tests knowledge of what happened to royalty during the most radical phase of the French Revolution, when the revolutionary courts used the guillotine to punish those seen as enemies of the new order. Among the listed queens, the one who fits the description of being found guilty of treason and then executed by guillotine is Marie Antoinette. She was tried by the Revolutionary Tribunal in 1793, convicted of treason and related charges, and executed by guillotine in October of that year. The other queens listed lived in earlier periods and did not face the revolutionary charges or the execution by guillotine that the Revolution carried out.

4. The Bastille is located in which city?

The key idea is knowing where the Bastille was located and its place in French history. The Bastille was a fortress-prison situated in Paris, built to defend the eastern approaches to the city and to hold prisoners for the Crown. By the late 18th century it had become a powerful symbol of royal authority, and its storming by Parisian crowds in 1789 became a defining moment of the French Revolution. Because of this strong association with Paris, the Bastille is located in that city. The other options—Lyon, Marseille, and Nice—are important French cities, but they are not the location of the Bastille.

5. Why was the guillotine considered a more humane form of punishment?

The main idea here is equality in punishment. The guillotine was promoted as humane because it treated everyone the same, regardless of social status. Under the Ancien Régime, executions and punishments varied by birth; nobles could escape harsher penalties or receive more privileged treatment, while common people faced harsher, more public methods. Introducing a single, standardized method of execution meant that justice was applied uniformly to all, which the revolutionaries framed as a more rational and humane approach. The quick, mechanical nature of the device reinforced the claim that death could be swift and impartial, free from the biases of rank.

Bastille Day is France's national celebration, observed on July 14, 1789. The storming of the Bastille became a powerful symbol of the people rising against tyranny and the start of the French Revolution, signaling the country's move toward popular sovereignty. That moment is remembered as the birth of the French nation and its ideals of liberty, equality, and fraternity, which is why this date is treated as France's Independence Day. The other dates point to different events: July 4, 1776 is American Independence Day; August 26, 1789 marks the adoption of the Declaration of the Rights of Man and of the Citizen; June 17, 1789 isn't tied to a widely celebrated revolutionary milestone in the same way.

The main idea here is recognizing the legislative body that existed in pre-revolutionary France and could be convened only with the king's approval. The Estates-General was that assembly—the representative body of all three estates (the clergy, the nobility, and the commoners). It was not a standing parliament; it met only when the king summoned it and with his permission, often to approve taxes or pursue reforms. In May 1789, Louis XVI called the Estates-General to meet at Versailles for the first time in many decades, a moment that helped push forward demands for constitutional change and ultimately contributed to the Revolution. The other options refer to the social orders themselves (First Estate, Third Estate) or to the collective concept of the estates (Estates), not to the actual legislative body that met by royal invitation.

Understanding which device became the symbol and standard method of execution during the French Revolution helps see how the era framed punishment as a part of revolutionary equality. The guillotine was introduced in 1792 and quickly became the preferred instrument for carrying out executions. It was designed to be swift and relatively humane, and its use was promoted as an egalitarian form of justice: regardless of rank or status, the condemned faced the same mechanism. During the Reign of Terror, public executions by guillotine were widespread, making the device closely associated with revolutionary action and the regime's attempt to enforce its laws. Other methods—such as the noose, axe, or sword—had been used in earlier periods or in different contexts, but they were not the emblem or the chief instrument of execution during the Revolution. The guillotine stands out as the device most closely tied to that historical moment and its goals of equal treatment under the law.

9. Under the 1791 Constitution, which body was established to govern the state?

The 1791 Constitution established a Legislative Assembly to govern the state. This body was the main lawmaking and oversight force within a constitutional framework, with the king's powers sharply limited. It marked a shift from the earlier, more radical revolutionary leadership toward a more conservative, representative assembly that could draft and pass laws while the executive acted within constitutional bounds. Context helps: the National Convention came later, after the monarchy was abolished in 1792, and the Directory took over under a different constitutional arrangement in 1795. The Estates-General was the pre-revolutionary assembly that last met in 1789 and then dissolved as the revolution moved forward. So, the Legislative Assembly is the body specifically created by the 1791 Constitution to govern the state.

In prerevolutionary France, society was divided into three estates. The Third Estate included the bourgeoisie, the sans-culottes, and the peasants. They bore the burden of most taxes and had no special privileges, unlike the clergy and nobility who enjoyed exemptions and privileges. The description fits the Third Estate because it captures the non-clerical, non-noble commoners who faced taxation without corresponding political privileges. The First Estate (clergy) and the Second Estate (nobility) were the privileged groups, not the ones described here, and peasants alone don't convey the full social range of the Third Estate.
