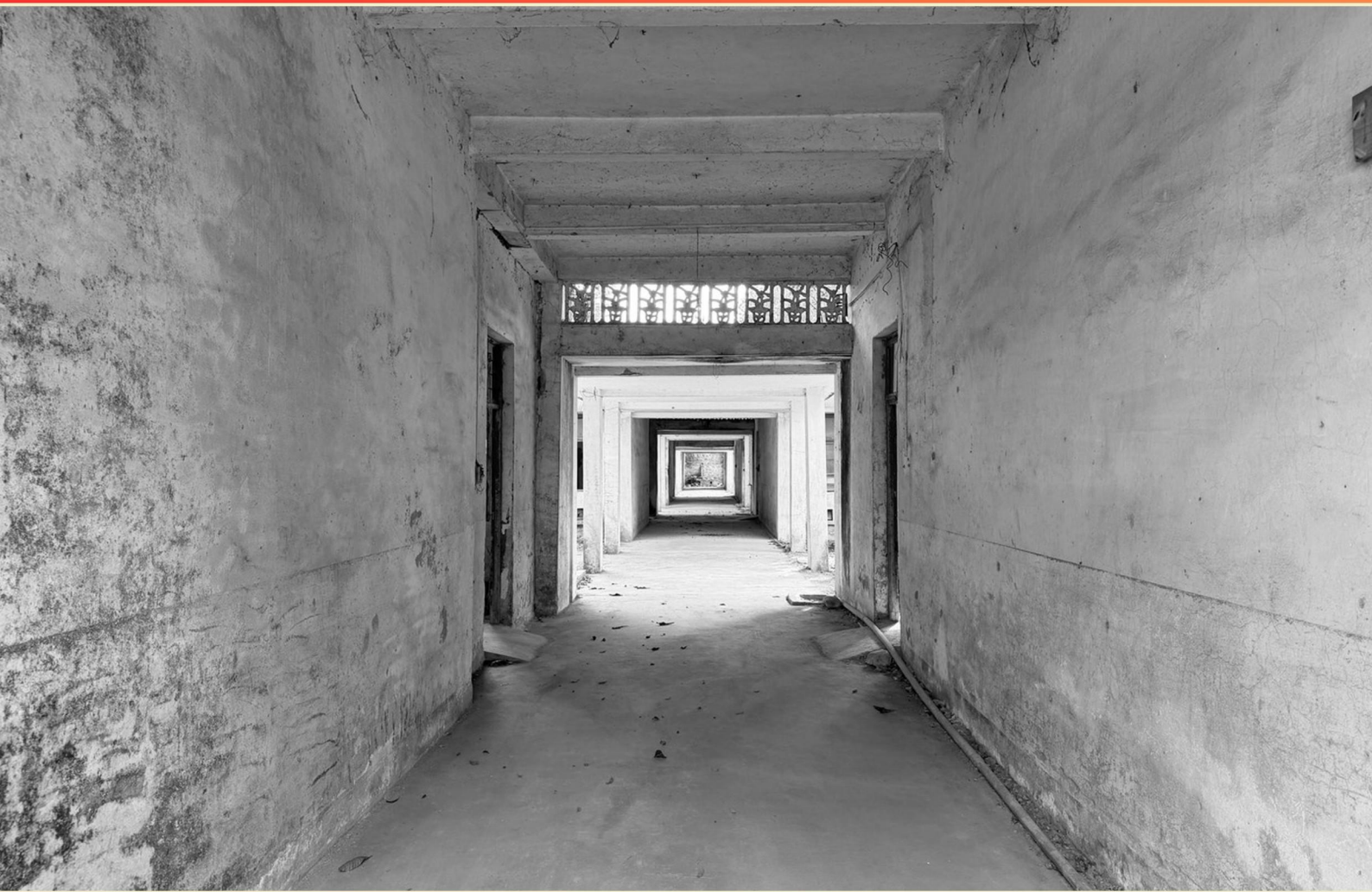

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Explanations

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1. Which anatomical detail is noted about Gregor's transformation?

The detail being tested highlights Gregor's insect-like transformation, specifically describing a brown plated abdomen. This image conveys a drastic move from human to creature, using armor-like plating to emphasize rigidity, detachment, and the grotesque nature of the metamorphosis. In other words, the final moment captures a fragile, empty optimism. They glimpse prospects for a better life, but those prospects are tainted by the cost of Gregor's treatment and the sense that their progress hinges on his absence. The ending isn't a celebration of a restored normal life; it's a cautious, unsettled forward look that acknowledges both relief and underlying moral fatigue. The other options miss this nuance. It isn't a triumphant return to normal life, since the story presents lasting strain and a lack of true reconciliation. It isn't a certainty that Gregor's memory will fade, because the focus is on the family's forward-looking stance rather than a clear statement about memory. And there isn't a vindictive resolve to punish Gregor; the emphasis is on moving ahead, not seeking retribution.

The living space is gradually closed off from Gregor, and the family begins to exclude him from daily life, treating him as something to manage or hide rather than a member of the family. This process culminates in a sense of relief and a new start for the family after Gregor's death. So, the best answer is that they progressively see him as a burden and begin to exclude him.

Gregor's reaction shows how strongly he identifies with being the family's provider and how quickly that role collapses under his transformation. The sheet lets him retreat visually, making it seem as though he's not there, which fits his aim of avoiding upsetting her. Grete's entrance and care are central to this moment, showing Gregor's lingering concern for her despite his condition. Simply staying quiet or sitting still wouldn't remove his presence the moment she sees him; covering himself with a blanket could still reveal him as a form under cover, whereas a sheet acts as a clearer, more deliberate attempt to vanish from sight.

Gregor's composed, rational stance stands out in contrast to the others' emotional upheaval, illustrating his persistence of self-control even in a bizarre, frightening situation.
